Here in the office we have been quite busy the past few weeks arranging for the passing of the old year-audit ing accounts, compiling reports, etc. etc. With the usual foresight President Lyman conceived the idea some week ago of completing the current vol-ume of the Star with an annual report of the work done in the mission. The of the work done in the mission. The result is we lay it before our readers this week. It covers the eleven months, between the first of January and the thirtieth of November, and tells na in-teresting tale. I can assure you. For the period mentioned the report shows the distribution of 156 who reacts, this the distribution of 1,540,290 tracts, this work representing visits to 598,434 stranger's houses. The three leaders in Great Britain are in the London, Scottish and Manchester conferences, these having distributed respectively 148,046, 136,029 and 113,593. In the matter of conversations, however, other confer ences lead, the best being Bristol, with one to about every nine tracts, and Birmingham with one to about every In continental Europe the ten tracts. general average is five tracts to every conversation. The difference, of course, is readily accounted for when one understands the conditions in the two sec tions of the mission. Open-air meet-ings reached a grand total of 3,376, 88 of these coming from continental Europe. London leads here also, with Scotland second and Wales third. The year's second and Wales third. The year's baptisms show the gratifying total of 1,992 as against 1,605 for the calendar year of 1900. In Great Britain the result ranges from 6½ per man in Grims-by to a fraction over 1 in Wales, New castle being second with nearly 6, Leeds third with 5%, and Sheffield and Iveland forth with nearly 4 each. On one continent the showing is: The Nether-lands, 8; Switzerland a little over 5. Germany, 4.7; Scandinavia a fraction over 3; Turkey, 1 1-3, Iceland is not reported. These are the general results as reflected in our yearly report and I can tell you President Lyman is a pleased man in consequence. It shows this much: that the Elders and sisters are alive to the obligations devolving upon them. All have worked nobly and well and deserve much praise
