Elder John M. Mills Points Out Incidents of American History At the Tabernacle.

INDIANS EXPECTED THE BOOK.

Elder Joseph E. Taylor Bears Record Of the Divinity of the Mission Of Joseph Smith.

An interesting review of the contents of the Book of Mormon was given at the Tabernacle Sunday afternoon by Elder John M. Mills, who spoke at some length on the coming forth of the book and gave a history of the incidents leading up to the great battle at the Hill Ramah. Elder Mills was followed by Elder Joseph E. Taylor, who testified of the mission of Joseph Smith, and that the work he was the instrument in bringing forth, was true. President John R. Winder presided. The choir sang the hymn:

Zion stands with hills surrounded, Zion kept by power divine.

Prayer was offered by President The choir further sang:

Glory to God on high Let heaven and earth reply, Praise ye His name.

Elder John M. Mills was the first speaker. He said that the Latter-day saints had a message to bear to the world, and this should be borne without undue loss of time. The message referred to was contained in the books delivered unto us, which should be carefully studied in order that men night prepare themselves for respon-

It is not enough for men to be pas-sively good, they should be aggressive-ly good all the days of their lives. In King Benjamin's day the Lord required King Benjamin's day the Lord required undivided attention to His work. He made a similar requirement of the people today. It should not be said of Latter-day Saints as Rousseau had declared, that some lived to be 100 years old and yet died at their birth. Joseph Smith set a splendid example in this respect. His whole life, though comparatively a short one, was one fraught with activity from the day he received his first vision at the age of 14 years, till he was cruelly assassinated in Carthage jail. The appeal, therefore, was thage jail. The appeal, therefore, was urgent that they who had been recipients of the message he had to bear, show equal diligence in proclaiming it

to their fellow man, Elder Mills reviewed a portion of the contents of the Book of Mormon, and said that the Latter-day Saint's were greatly blessed, for in addition to the Holy Bible they had been given a history of God's dealings with His people on this continent. The speaker related a portion of the history of Alma, and told the story of the pieter which were told the story of the plates which were deposited in the hill Ramah and came forth in this day as an additional evi-dence of the hand-qualings of God with

indians is the testimony of a number of early writers of American history, among them Coulton, who in his "Origin of the American Indians," published in 1823, declares that they were constantly looking for some record written by their forefathers and which had been deposited in the earth for safe

The choir sang the anthem, "Light and Truth the World is waking," after which Elder Joseph E. Taylor addressed the meeting. He referred to the importance of the coming forth of the Book of Mormon, and said that when its dignity was clearly understood by book of Mormon, and said that when its divinity was clearly understood by the world generally, one of the book's most important predictions would be fulfilled, viz. that a nation would be born in a day. The coming forth of the Bible, the discovery of America, and the restoration of the Gospel of Lesus Chylet were forested over 2 division. Jesus Christ were foretold over 2,000 years ago. This was contained in the thirteenth chapter of I Nephi, a portion of which the speaker read. Through the goodness of God the record of the Book of Mormon was preserved till the latter days to bear witness of the truth and to gless in ways called wastering.

and to clear up many so-called mysteri-ous problems of the present age, Elder Taylor spoke of the fall of our first parents in the Garden of Eden, and its effect upon the work of the latter days. In this as in all other respects the wisdom of God was fully established and men were better for its having became so. Beautiful Memorial Window at St. Mark's Cathedral Unveiled Yesterday.

BISHOP SPALDING'S ADDRESS.

Rev. Eddy Discusses Question, "Will The World Ever Have a Universal Religion?"

The memorial window placed in St. Mark's cathedral in honor of the late Bishop Abiel Leonard, was unveiled yesterday, by his successor in the Episcopacy, Rh. Rev. Bishop F. S. Spalding.

The windowis the gift of the Rowland
Hall girls and is in the west transept
of the cathedral. It was made in Munich, Germany, and the illustration
is "Christ sending out His apostles."
Prior to the unveiling Dean Earlie
made a short Airess in which he said:
"Justtwo years ago our late bishop lay
on what proved to be his dying bed.
Two years ago on the 3rd of December
next he passed from the wearhess,
from the labor of everything of this life. from the labor of everything of this life to the rest that remaineth for the people of God—to the paradise of God. It is eminently fitting that something in this church should bear his name. Row-land hall has presented to the parish this window, which shall be consecrated this day to the glory of God and to the loving memory of our late bishop Abiel Leonard."

BISHOP SPALDING'S ADDRESS.

Bishop Spalding and Dean Eddie then unveiled the window together and the bishop offered prayer in thanks for the completion of this work. The bishop then preached from Acts xix: 18; "And immediately there fell from his eyes as it had been scales, and he received sight, and forthwith he arose and was baptized." Bishop Spalding then said in part: "It seems to me that no more appropriate memorial could be given to a man who lived as one of God's Saints that this window and through it the light of God's sunshine comes and makes it beautiful. There was always the difficulty to determine how much of the light came from the window—man's personality, and how window-man's personality, and how much of the light was merely trans-mitted, coming from without. When this building is illuminated by its own light that window will be dull and dead; but it is only when the light from God's sunshine outside comes streaming through it that we see its beauty and we learn its lessons.

There are four great words in the with reference to the character of the Saints. St. Paul spoke of the know-ledge and purity of the saints, and St. John referred to the patience and righteousness of the saints." . .

BLINDED BY PREJUDICE.

St. Paul rightly says that we see through a glass darkly, and Prof. James of Harvard university agrees with St. Paul when he says that a man is very much like a building and the windows through which the light spent streams, and if the windows were not Who darkened by our prejudices and our sins the light would come through bet-ter and we would see the knowledge of the Saints as the knowledge that comes from God and comes from without just as the light comes through the window. The patience referred to in the New Testament means literally standing under the never flinching; that was the patience of the Saints. Stand under the burden bravely and patiently and in time you will win out because He is the victory.

BISHOP LEONARD'S WORK.

"The righteousness of the Saints "The righteousness of the Saints summed it all up and every man can have the power for righteousness within him which will help him to his own righteousness. I think it might have been more appropriate if today one that lived and worked with the late bishop should have spoken to you. For nearly a year I have been going up and down this great district and trying to follow in his steps and I have been imfollow in his steps and I have been im-pressed as men told me about him. pressed as men told me about him. I have been more and more impressed with the faithfulness with which he spread the knowledge of God; with the purity and the cleanness of his life, not a breath ever to the contrary, and with the patience with which he stood under the great burden without complaining. Bishop Tuttle told me that when it was proposed to make Western Colorado a part of this great district, already more than a man could well attend to, if Bishop Leonard had stood up in the house of bishops and protested it might have been given to another man, but, as Bishop Tuttle said, that was not his way. He said: 'If the church wants me to try I will try to do the best I can,' and they gave him the largest district in the United States. Such a time was a crucial one for such men, and failure to obtain practical assistance to find work often led to their drifting right back to the state prison. POWER OF PURPOSE.

WOMACK HELD TO DISTRICT COURT

Slayer of Joseph Mathews Must Stand Trial for Murder in The First Degree.

KAIGHN'S MOTION DENIED.

Court Says Defendant Did Wrong in Arming Himself When Called Out by Mathews.

Frank Womack, the young man who, on the night of Oct. 22, shot and killed Joseph Mathews during a fight in the latter's home, will have to stand trial in the third judicial district court on

the serious charge of murder in the first degree. The preliminary hearing was held be-fore Judge C. B. Diehl of the criminal division of the city court, and lasted for more than three days. This morn-ing Judge Diehl rendered a decision on the motion of Col. Kaighn, for the defense, asking that the accused be discharged on the grounds that the state

In commenting on the evidence, Judge In commenting on the evidence, Judge Diehl sald in substance:
"If the defendant had not armed himself when he was called out, in a peaceful manner, by Mr. Mathews, he ought to have been discharged by this court. But the fact that he did so arm himself, and the fact that two hours previous he had a friendly conversation with the designation. versation with the deceased, I feel my duty to have a higher court and my duty to have a higher court and a jury further investigate the case. It seems to me that all has not been told; that something has been withheld. I therefore find that the offense has been committed and that there is probable cause to believe the defendant guilty thereof, and he will be held without bail?

Col. Kaighn, for the defense, then asked that a bond be fixed, but the motion was quickly overruled by Judge Diehl. Col. Kaighn's request that a opy of the transcript of the testimony furnished the defense, at the expense of the state, was granted.
