polygamy openly practised to a con-siderable extent. Whether this is true or not we do not know. We have heard rumors to that effect, but they were from no authoritative source whatever. We do know that the 3,500 Mormons in this state are thrifty and lawabiding, and their colonies are the only successand their colonies are the only success-ful ones ever planted by foreigners in this country. The Mexican law recog-nizes but one legal wife, and if these Mormons are practising polygamy their wives have no legal standing. We are of the opinion that there is very little polygamy in these colonies, if any at all."
