It is now definitely announced that today or tomorrow at the latest will mark the commencement of active work on the new Auditorium on Richards street. The contract is said to have been virtually let on Saturday last, and there is now no further reason for de-lay of any kind. The contract price of the building is said to be approximately \$21,000. Sixty days is the maximum time allowed for the completion of the building, and a fine of \$50 a day will be imposed for each additional day con-sumed.


