

DENVER GIVES ITS SUPPORT.

Queen City of Plains Interested in the San Pedro Line.

MESSAGE SENT TO CLARK.

Meeting of Directors in Salt Lake Terminates This Morning—Officials Scattering to Various Points.

The directors' meeting of the San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake terminated this morning. Senator W. A. Clark left at 9:45 a. m. for Butte.

When seen after the meeting this morning Mr. Gibbon stated that there was nothing to give out for the information of the general public; the brief session held this morning, he said, was mainly devoted to the passing of some resolutions.

The afternoon session of the board yesterday lasted for three and a half hours and was mainly devoted to the reports of Mr. Gibbon and Engineer McCarney.

DENVER WANTS THE ROAD.

During the progress of the meeting of the directors in this city numerous telegrams have been received by President W. A. Clark from all over the West in which support of the enterprise is promised.

In the face of the message and developments that are shaping the Colorado Middle, which is outside the Harriman-Gould combination, it is stated in some quarters that there is something very significant in the dispatch from Denver.

THE OFFICIAL CIRCULAR.

Text of the Notification of Changes on Utah-Colorado Line.

The text of the circular issued last night by Assistant General Traffic Manager S. H. Babcock of the Utah-Colorado lines (which was forecast in last night's "News") is as follows: "The following effective this date: Mr. J. D. Kenworthy will be general agent of the freight department and Mr. B. F. Nevins western livestock agent, each for both companies, with offices at Salt Lake City, Utah.

STRIKE SETTLED.

Philadelphia & Reading Railroad Ignores the Labor Union.

Philadelphia, July 2.—President George F. Baer of the Philadelphia & Reading Railway company has given out the following signed statement: "The Reading Railway shop strike has been settled upon the following basis:

"The men to return to work at once just as they were before they went out. The men to be restored to the Philadelphia & Reading Relief Association with like effect as though they had not left the employ of the company.

"The labor union not to be recognized. We will employ any one we please and no distinction will be made between union and non-union men.

"After the men have returned to work a committee of the shops, representing all the workmen can be appointed by our employees. We will appoint a committee composed of superintendents and foremen of the shops to meet the workmen's committee and the whole subject of wages to be considered by this joint committee with power to agree upon a new scale of wages which shall be fair and just both to the men and the company.

"These committees are to begin work as quickly as they are elected. In case, after a reasonable effort, the joint committee cannot agree, I will personally meet the joint committee and endeavor to adjust the differences. It is understood that if any new scale is agreed upon it shall, when adopted, be effective July 1, 1901. Transportation will be given to the committee to visit any of the shops with a view of ascertaining the scale of wages in force in such shops."

EXCITING RUNAWAY.

While the fire department was answering a call to Meredith's fire this afternoon a lively team attached to a milk wagon belonging to the Keystone dairy entered into the spirit of the occasion and endeavored to beat the hose wagon out. It is true, they started a little late, but their efforts were none the less earnest.

The time Market Row was reached and the scattering that ensued among the pedestrians was sublime. Round the corner north on West Temple street swung the runaway, over went the wagon amid a crash of glass and the next minute the wreck and two horses piled up on a team of mules outside a blacksmith's shop.

EXPLOSION AND FIRE.

This afternoon at about 3:10 a large quantity of fire works on exhibition in front of A. H. Meredith's bicycle store on East Temple street, just below Third South, suddenly exploded, setting fire to the awning and the front part of the building.

Officer Sperry was on the scene at the time and immediately turned an alarm into the fire department. The explosion of the fireworks was so terrific it caused a panic among the people standing near the fire alarm coming in within a few seconds caused a great deal of excitement, and led to the belief that there had been an explosion in one of the gun stores.
