

## HOW PLUMBERS WORK THE PUBLIC

Some Inside History of Master's Association and Its Ambitions.

### BOYCOTTING INDEPENDENTS.

It is Done to Keep the Consumer From Installing Material For Himself.

The master plumbers of San Francisco are brought into the glare of public opinion, in a series of exposures of trust methods, being made in that city.

The count against the master plumbers is that they have organized to restrict trade in plumbing material. About six big wholesale hardware houses were in the combine with the plumbers, and they established an arbitrary price list which all were to enforce, and a fine of \$50 was to be imposed for any deviation from it. This group was recently broken up in part by the enactment of what is known as the Cartwright law, and for the first time in years San Francisco enjoyed an eastern drop in plumbing prices—that is, for materials.

The master plumbers, however, hold their grip on the situation. It works just as does a similar organization in Salt Lake, by threat of boycott, and by threats of boycott. There is no understanding but that it is effectively restricted, nevertheless, for it prescribes just what plumbing materials are, and just who are plumbers, and consequently just who may buy. If a supply house sells to anyone not on the list, that house is boycotted.

#### EXPLAINS SOME MYSTERIES.

That this is done in Salt Lake is not clear, but it is certain that many plumbers will not buy plumbing material except what bought through them, or their association, also that an outsider cannot buy plumbing materials without paying an enormous profit, that in many cases has made it cheaper for the household to have the goods installed, rather than to try to put them in himself.

The San Francisco association affiliated with the master association and backed by it. This is just what happened in the case of the butchers and grocers, who imposed a national office to come here and sweep over the sins of ordering goods by mail order, this in trust theory being one of the principal things the association must fight—any possible source of competition.

#### WHO MAY BUY.

The Master Plumbers' association does not say to supply houses that they shall sell no goods to plumbing houses, nor members of the association. It says that they shall deal only with master plumbers, and certain other plumbers recognized by the association, but who are not members—men on whom it fears to make a fight because of the trade standing, and the credence that would be given public protests from them.

After saying who shall buy plumbing goods, the association proceeds to say what plumbing goods are. These are hot-water tanks and connections, closets and connections, bathtubs and trimmings, wash trays and trimmings, soil pipe and fittings, stoppers and connections, cedar drains and connections, lead supply pipe, lead waste pipe, lead traps, special boiler unions for hot-water connections, lead sweeps and bends, brass ferrules and ground brass unions, and, in fact, everything that pertains exclusively to the plumbing business. The list does not include iron pipe, as this is used outside the plumbing business. Neither does it include hot-water boilers, as there are used for compressors and gas tanks, but plumbers take care that none of them shall be sold for water-heating purposes by saying that the special hot-water unions shall not be sold to any except plumbers. When a boiler is intended for heating water, it is necessary to make the connections with special unions, and these unions that is possible for no one but a plumber to buy. Therefore, it would be useless, although possible, to buy the tank.

#### CAN'T BUY BATHTUB.

It is not contended that it should be possible for a person to buy a bathtub at retail (from a wholesale house), but it is contended that it should be possible for a dealer to buy from a master plumber under the plumber installs it. It is possible to buy such a tub from a hardware store, because a tub is not exclusively a plumbing article, but a bathtub is. One cannot buy a bathtub anywhere except from a master plumber, and not from him unless he installs it.

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site as to suffer from this sort of a boycott for two years. This firm has supply houses in all the large cities in the United States, and in the case of Kansas City house, could not afford to do this if it could not be acknowledged by the Master Plumbers' association as being entitled to buy exclusively plumbing goods. A boycott was declared and lasted for two years. Crane & Co. is a very wealthy house; it does a business that extends beyond the sphere of the Master Plumbers' association, and the goods it sells are not known as being exclusively plumbing goods, and it has a very large trade among plumbers that were not affiliated with the association. With all these things in its favor it managed to survive the boycott but a house less fortunate situated would certainly have succumbed.

The Master Plumbers' association, however, it could not raise the funds to have the boycott off. At the time the boycott was withdrawn it was asserted by the association that this firm had promised to be good in future. The head of the house flatly denied this assertion, but the boycott was not removed.

Dalzell & Miller also suffered from a boycott of the Master Plumbers' association, although it was not so serious as that declared against Crane company. Dalzell & Miller repudiated their faults, and the boycott was declared off. Since that time no firm dealing in plumbing supplies has had the temerity to sell plumbing goods to any concern not recognized by the Master Plumbers' association as being entitled to buy. At present there is no boycott because all the houses are good.

#### OBJECT OF COERCION.

The object of this coercion is to prevent houses that are not in a position to install plumbing goods from buying them. Take Holbrook, Merrill & Stefson as an illustration. This firm might receive an order from a hardware dealer for several hundred feet of iron pipe, several boxes of screws, several boxes of nail cutters, red and copper tools and one four-inch brass ferrule. Holbrook, Merrill & Stefson would be compelled to turn down the entire order, or to ship the order without the brass ferrule, saying that they were out of brass ferrules at the time. For a brass ferrule, worth 25 cents, it might be necessary to turn down an order worth hundreds of dollars, or to offend a customer of long standing. This is the effect of the Master Plumbers' association on the dealer.

#### MILKING THE CONSUMER.

Of course, in this case, as in all others, it is the consumer that the association is finally after. It is the consumer that gives down the milk. The only reason the association says that a hardware dealer shall not buy tubs is that the consumer shall not buy them from the hardware dealer and the hardware dealer is compelled to do work that the plumber insists upon doing, and it is here that he makes his unreasonable profits. The cost of any fixture is always less than one-half what the consumer pays for it installed, unless the work is done under contract.

The Master Plumbers' Association has a code of ethics, and it is a general understanding that its members shall charge a profit of 100 per cent on all but contract work. Where a contractor has a whole house in which the plumbing plant is to be installed, he always sublets the plumbing contract. Bills have to be submitted for this work, and there is no reason why a plumbing plant profit can't be made. But where a household wants to put a new bathtub in his home in place of an old one, it is not convenient to advertise for bids on so small a piece of work and the plumber is usually ordered to do the work and bill it.

A brass bib or faucet costs a plumber about 15 cents, and he spends about two minutes work to install one. You can buy such a bib at a hardware store for 45 cents, and screw it on yourself. If a plumber is doing other work in your house he will charge you \$1.50 for installing the bib. If he has to send a man to the house especially to do the work, he will charge a dollar an hour, and the bill will be \$1.50 plus the hour and 40 cents, or more, for a helper to carry the man's tools.
