SENATE.

In the Senate, N.Y., from the committee on Territories, reported back the House bill for the appointment of the members of the Territorial Councils of Wyoming and Colorado, which passed also from the same committee, adversely on the bill relating to the organization of the Territory of Alaska.

NEW YORK.

Fire.—Particulars of Railway Accident.

TRAY, 17.—There were two fires here last night. Moore and Bro. in the stove and furnishing goods business, lost about \$5,000; insured for \$2,000. Three tenement houses on the corner of Madison and Fourth Streets, were burned. Loss about \$7,000; fully insured.

New York, 17.—A Troy dispatch gives additional particulars of the Railroad accident last night. The Montreal express train, which left New York at four p. m. yesterday, ran off the track between this city and Albany, about ten p. m. A broken rail threw the train from the track and, after running about twenty rods, upon the ties, the rear engine, which was carrying the baggage car, and that car and a palace car tumbled down into a ravine. The palace car immediately took fire from the gasoline on board, and both the cars were burnt up. The passengers, however, escaped through the windows. Alfred Hillyard, of Pennsylvania, upon returning into the car for his baggage, was severely burned about the head and neck, but not fatally. Others were burned, but not seriously. The mails and baggage were saved.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Resolution demanding protection to American Citizens.

BOSTON, 17.—The Massachusetts legislative committee on federal relations reported a resolution, yesterday, representing that the arbitrary and unfriendly action of the Canadians toward American fishermen constitutes a grievance demanding the attention and protection of the General Government.

OHIO.

Sedition shot.

CLEVELAND, 17.—Major fish, of the Chief House, Rock River, was shot and killed last night by a German girl, named Fanny Drose. The girl charges fish with having seduced and then abandoned her. She is now in custody in this city.

FOREIGN NEWS.

CREAT BRITAIN.

Petition for universal suffrage.—Romanian co-operation.—German concentration on the Loire.—Falkenstein to be Governor of Paris, if occupied.

LONDON, 17.—Advices from Dieppe state that Emperor William has consented to a proposal to receive the contributions on the lower Seine.

A Leipzig petition to the French National Assembly, circulating among the prisoners in Germany, requests the question of a monarchy or a republic to be submitted to universal suffrage.

There was no meeting of the conference yesterday. It was adjourned in the expectation of the arrival of the French representative.

A letter from Prince Napoleon denies that the Prince has offered himself to Bismarck as the successor of the Emperor.

The Times Berlin dispatch says: If peace is not concluded, King William will probably remain in Versailles. It is stated that the German troops are concentrating in large numbers on the Loire.

If the occupation of Paris is necessary, Falkenstein is designated for governor.

The Prussians demand three hundred thousand francs at Bernay, in the department of Eure, which place is under threat of bombardment.

The Roumanian Senate has voted a resolution of complete devotion towards the Prince, and entire co-operation in the aid of the government. Clemenceau has been appointed Greek war minister.

A Telegraph's special dispatch says: The Emperor William is suffering from a severe attack of rheumatism.

FRANCE.

Resolution giving Thiers the President of the Republic.—Adjournment to preserve liberty of discussion.—Falkenstein to be Governor of Paris, if occupied.

BORDEAUX, 18.—The Vice Presidents elected in the Assembly are: Martel, Benoit, Dore, Vital and De Mallerie.

A resolution was introduced in the Assembly, investing Thiers with the Chief Executive power of the Republic, to be exercised under the control of the Assembly. Thiers to nominate the Ministry. The resolution was signed by De Mallerie, Mallerie, Vital and Saini Hillaire.

In the Assembly a deputy censured the manifestation yesterday, outside the Chamber, and adjured the Paris Chamber to preserve liberty of discussion. Violent recriminations ensued between the Conservatives and Republicans.

The present chamber is strongly guarded outside.

PRINCE EDWARD'S ISLAND.

Resolution of confidence in the Governor.

CHICAGO, 17.—The governor in opposition to the resolution of confidence in the Governor, which was passed by the Assembly, and the question of excluding United States vessels from so many privileges, having been submitted to the Imperial government, a reply was received, which led to a removal of the prohibitory restrictions.
