Tom Tobin, a famous Indian scout of Kit Carson's day, is dead at Garland, Colo., at the age of 82. He was especially noted for the killing of the Apachians, the fanatics who started out to kill as many white people as possible. Tobin was perhaps the only man they ever met who lived to tell the story. He was saved by a pocket book, which stopped the bullets. He determined to rid the frontier of the blood-thirsty creatures and succeeded one day in trailing them into a thicket and shooting them. The heads of both savages were cut off and taken into Fort Garland for exhibition by the old scout. Tobin spent much of his life as a professional trapper.

# THREE DISTRICT AGENTS FOR O. S. L.

Messrs D. R. Gray, H. O. Wilson  
And F. H. Plaisted to Look  
After Traffic Affairs.

## NEW POLICY IS INAUGURATED.

Popular Salt Lake Official Falls Into A Very Good and Well Deserved Title.

Effective June 1 David Ramsey Gray of Salt Lake will be appointed district freight and passenger agent for the Oregon Short Line, with headquarters in this city, and H. O. Wilson at Butte.

will be given a similar title for the state of Montana.

There have been rumors of the appointments on the streets since the day the Stubbs party came here, but nothing official has been forthcoming. It is stated that Mr. Gray's territory will include Utah and also take in the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific from Green river to Reno. When seen this morning General Traffic Manager T. M. Schumacher admitted that such appointments would be made but declined to discuss the extent of Mr. Gray's territory as this has yet to be definitely decided.

The traveling freight and passenger agents who make their headquarters in Salt Lake and Ogden will all report to Mr. Gray, who in turn reports to headquarters here.

With these two appointments the Oregon Short Line will be parcelled off into three districts. Mr. Gray taking the biggest and most important, Frank H. Plaisted, Idaho, and H. O. Wilson, Montana.

D. R. Gray, whose picture is presented by the "News," was appointed general agent of the freight and passenger departments of the Oregon Short Line in this city for the Harriman system, Sept. 1, 1901. He is yet a young man, born in 1886, Loveland, O. He received his advanced education at the Wesleyan university at Delaware, O. He entered the railroad service in 1884 as clerk in the Pennsylvania railroad office at Cambridge City, Ind., where he remained until 1896, when he began a four years' course at the Wesleyan university. After completing his college course he entered the general offices of the Southern Pacific in San Francisco. A year later he came to Salt Lake as contracting agent for the company, a position he held until October, 1892, when he was advanced to general agent, when Harriman secured control of the Espee. Mr. Gray was promptly advanced to represent the entire Harriman interests in the capacity of general agent.

Aside from his good railroad record Mr. Gray figures prominently in Salt Lake society and has a host of friends here who will be glad to congratulate him upon his well deserved promotion.

## GREGORY GOES TO PROVO.
