AFFAIRS OF WEBER COUNTY

Strong Protests Against Ogden Canyon Liquor Traffic—Don't Want Schools United.

Bride of Three Months Attempts Suicide—Chasman Demented—Session of City Council.

The board of county commissioners met in regular session yesterday. All commissioners were present and most of the session was taken up in hearing protests on the consolidation of the school districts.

Three more petitions, against the granting of licenses to sell liquor in Ogden canyon were filed, to be taken up by the board when all the petitions are in, then all will be acted upon together. One of the petitions was presented by Judge Jacob S. Boreman, signed by the prohibition alliance. The other two were presented by Joseph C. Chee, and were signed by citizens of Ogden.

Petitioners were presented the following school districts: Wilson, with 103 signers; Riverdale, 42 signers; Kaneville, 24 signers, against the consolidation of school districts. Representatives from the above district as well as from Harrisville, Randall, and Beech Creek were present and talked against the consolidation. The matter was taken under advisement by the committee having the matter in hand.

A petition was received and read from residents of Harrisville, asking for the opening of a road in that district. Referred to Commissioner Powers.

The \$1,500 bond of F. M. Farrell, who has the jail contract, with J. J. Jones, J. J. O'Connor and J. G. Read as sureties, was referred to the committee on jail.

At the request of H. C. Wardleigh, of the G. A. R., it was ordered that the county clerk defray the burial expenses of Capt. Justus Withersell, an old and respected ex-soldier and a resident of Weber county, who passed away Saturday evening.

Commissioner Wilson reported that the work of painting the fences and water-tanks in Ogden canyon would begin this week.

Mr. Wilson recommended that the heads of the departments of the county, on or before the first of July furnish the auditor with a list of supplies needed and that bids on the same be called for.

ATTEMPTED SUICIDE.
A bride of only three months made a desperate attempt to commit suicide by swallowing a dose of morphine at the Washington House, a lodginghouse near the corner of Washington avenue and Twenty-third street yesterday. That she is not dead is owing to the fact that she did not secure a large enough dose of morphine.

The girl, for she is just 18, gives her name as Mrs. Cornelius Hodge, and in company with her husband she came to the Washington House on Wednesday last. Saturday afternoon, the husband, who is apparently about 22, and a carpenter by trade, left ostensibly to secure work. Since that time he has not been seen and it is questioned as to whether he has deserted the girl wife or has secured work in some of the outside settlements. It is probable, however, that the girl, discouraged by her homeless and friendless condition, deliberately planned her act of self-destruction.

According to her own story she took the morphine yesterday morning and laid all day yesterday and last night in a stupor from which she was slowly roused when Mr. Brown, the landlady of the house, entered the room this morning. The latter hastily summoned Chief of Police Browning and Detective Pender and they, after making a hasty examination, sent for Dr. Forbes. The latter gave the young woman medicine which soon placed her out of danger.

The girl freely admits she took the drug with suicidal intent, but is very reticent about the causes for the deed and somewhat contradictory in her statements. She says that she is 18 years of age and was married to Cornelius Hodge in San Jacinto, Riverside county, Cal., on Jan. 7 last. They left there three weeks ago and visited her step-parents who reside in Iowa and then returned as far as Ogden. She says she has a brother named Fisher, living on Owen avenue in Chicago. She does not want any of her relatives to be notified as they are not financially able to help her. She says she wants to die and the police and people who are now caring for her think that by this expression she intends again to attempt her life.

At present she is without money or friends and charitably disposed persons can find here a worthy object for their aid.

DEMENTED CHINAMAN.
A demented Chinaman was picked up by the officers on Twenty-eighth street yesterday. He has not been identified and is detained at the city jail. He will probably be examined and sent to the asylum.

MIND AFFECTED ON TRAIN.
Charles Boise, a prominent citizen of Portland, Maine, who has been on a trip to California, became deranged yesterday while en route east because of the altitude. He was detained until this afternoon when he became so much better that he was allowed to continue his journey. He was accompanied by his sister-in-law.

IRRIGATORS INSTRUCTED.
State Engineer Doremus was up from Salt Lake late yesterday afternoon and met at the court house several irrigation representatives of canal and irrigation companies. He occupied the time in giving instructions as to the putting in of the new weir or measuring apparatus in all canals so as to insure an equitable distribution of water.

BOSTON'S BARBER REGULATIONS.
A special dispatch from Boston, May 1, 1903, to the N. Y. Sun, gives as new regulations of the Boston Board of Health as to barber shops: "Mugs, shaving brushes and razors shall be sterilized after each separate use thereof. A separate, clean towel shall be used for each person. Material to stop the flow of blood shall be used only in powdered form, and applied on a towel. Powder puffs are prohibited." Sheriff Clark was on his way to Ogden when he saw the man, whom he recognized from a description sent out by Sheriff Morrell of Platte.

TAX MATTERS CONSIDERED.
The state board of equalization, Messrs. R. C. Lund, J. J. Thomas, Thomas D. Dee and Sven O. Nielson, were in Provo yesterday and met with the board of county commissioners and Assessor Thorne for the purpose of considering the question of raising revenues for the state. The matter of making equitable assessments and the necessity of doing so was thoroughly discussed, and the assessor impressed with its importance. It is thought probable that the assessment will have to be raised by the board of equalization, and in that event it will be unjust to the taxpayer, already assessed to the full value of his property, to increase his assessment, while another taxpayer, who may only be assessed 50 per cent of the value of his property, will be subjected to no greater advance than the one whose property is already assessed at its full valuation, and the assessor was urged to guard against such discrimination.
