Ogden, Dec. 25 .-- An important change 1.50 will be inaugurated Jan. 1, 1906, by the Southern Pacific railway company, when it will put on an exclusive mail train to run between Ogden and San Francisco. This train is inaugurated by the company to make better time with the pany to make better time with the through mail from the east and west. No 9 Union Pacific will-arrive here every atternoon at 3:25 o'clock, and de-part five minutes later for California. It is to travel at the rate of 40 miles per hour the entire distance, saving several hours' time. Instead of arriv-ing in the evening in San Francisco as heretofore it will arrive about noon, thus enabling the distribution of the mail in San Francisco the afternoon it arrives enabling the public to receive 1,500 1.500 mail in San Francisco the afternoon it arrives, enabling the public to receive letters at least 15 hours sooner, as heretotfore the mail in arriving in the evening laid at the postoffice over night, and was not distributed to the public until the following morning, but by arriving at about noon as it will do after Jan. 1 it can be delivered the same afternoon. The mail coming east from the coast will arrive each after-noon on No. 10 at 6:30 p.m., and will leave here for the east, one hour later on Nov. 4. 1.5002.750

BALHINCH OF TINTIC.

A Vigorous Campaign of Development Inaugurated at This Mine.

Arrangements were completed this week for the reopening of the Balhinch property in North Tintic and yesterday work was commenced, says the Report-er of Eureka. Eugene Sanchi has been out from Salt Lake during the week and secured the gervices of H. Gustaldi of Eureka, who will serve the company as superintendent.

Years ago this property produced over \$35,000 worth of ore for its owners, Messrs, Riter and Brown, but since that time no ore has been shipped from the mine. The Helen Mining company was formed about six years ago and com-menced the development of this ground under a lease and bond and afterward the company was reorganized under the name of the Balhinch Mining company. The tunnel is now in a distance of 350 feet ad a shaft has also been sunk to a depth of 200 feet. Considerable drift-ing has been done on the tunnel level. and some ore has been encountered, al-though not in sufficient quantity to make a shipment. It is on the tunnel devel that the work will now be con-tinued. It is understood that outside capital has been secured and that an effort will again be made to place the mine in the list of producers. It is gen-erally considered as one of the best mining propositions in the state.
