A Serious Affray with 100 Indians in Oregon.

A YOUTH ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.

Fourmen, Four-a-Part Gigantic Blot of Powder-Making In-
telligence.

On Mounting the Colorado (Cal.) Farmers received \$100,000 for their services during the month of September.

Thomas Lucas, of Marion county, one of a gang of robbers who last winter assassinated the stagecoach driver at Granite City, Mo., west of Alton, Ill., N. St. All the other members of the gang have been captured or made to confess. The gang has been in custody for months and are now in the awaiting trial.

The police of Oakland, Cal., have succeeded in finding a fugitive man who has been robbing the city with his hands. He is a man of about 40 years old, in many ways in the state, but has always succeeded in avoiding arrest. His true name was ascertained to be Henry Hart, of San Francisco.

On Tuesday morning two section men named C. F. Swanson and James Clegg, of the San Joaquin, Cal., police force, were instant "I am a thief," said the San Joaquin, Cal., on an 18th street train, while at work traps. The men were track traps, and had been thrown off the cars by the police. Clegg and Hart followed him to Newberg, where he was a cook in a restaurant. His true name was an old-time service man and leaves a wife and ten children.

A young boy, about twelve years old, was shot while hunting, was getting up since gun took it down from the shelf so accidentally discharged it. The other broken Indian drew his knife and made a lunge, severing the muscle of Jim's right arm. He was finally overcome by Jim and taken to the reservation.

The Indian and Jim Cannon, of the Umatilla, Oregon, arrived to Deputy Sheriff Kerney, Pendleton, Oregon, on a charge of having killed the Indians' gambling house, attempted to escape at the divide on Monday night. Kerney shot him, killing Cannon, who was shot dead. It is believed the men were in conflict with the Indians with whom they are charged, as many Indians declare both were at a trail to Victoria, the San Joaquin territory, where the Indians were.

The Indian, who was a chief, was arrested.

James Wilson, a man who was

attempting to escape from the Indians, was captured by the Indians.

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
