A Good Man Gone.—We have to chronicle the death of Elder Dimick B. Huntington, who departed this life, this forenoon, at 25 minutes after 11 o'clock, the 71st year of his age. The cause of his demise was paralysis, with which he had been afflicted, at times, for two years, the last attack being about eight weeks ago, since which time he had been confined to his bed. The Sunday before he was taken ill, he had gone to meeting, as he said, "to hear his testimony for the last time," and spoke in defense of the truth, for which he had battled bravely all his life. The next day he fell sick. Among his closing words were the following: "I am dying by inches; but I am not afraid to die, for I have been an honest man." A volume could say no more. "Uncle Dimick," as he was familiarly and affectionately known, was an early member of the Church, passed through the Missouri persecutions and never wavered in the most trying scenes. He was a member of the "Mormon Battalion," and after being honorably discharged from duty, arrived in Utah four days after the advent of the pioneers in July, 1847. Since that time he has held the office of Indian Interpreter, and done a great work among the Lamanites, who called him "father," and knew and loved him for a true and warm-hearted friend.

He was much respected by all who knew him, and lived and died an honest man and a faithful servant of God.

Educational Association.—The Salt Lake County Educational Association met this morning in the Thirteenth Ward Assembly Rooms and was opened by prayer. Mr. H. W. Brown, trustee of the 25th school district, made some interesting remarks upon the duties of trustees, and the different ideas respecting such duties. The speaker gave his own views upon this subject and the manner in which the school was conducted in his district.

Miss Kittie Heywood gave a brief account of her manner of teaching writing.

Mr. Horace Cummings explained the uses and advantages of a knowledge of drawing.

Dr. Park made suggestions concerning the benefit to be derived from a discussion of the different methods of teaching, in which Supt. Lewis concurred.

Police Court.—Two persons were arrested last evening for being drunk, and disturbing the peace, one of them making use of profane language. This morning they were granted an interview with Justice Pyper, who furnished them food, lodging and work for a few days.

Jas. Canfield was arrested yesterday for stealing an overcoat. At 12 o'clock to-day the case was considered by Justice Pyper. The accused was found guilty and sentenced to 60 days at labor on the streets.

The examinations of the man and woman charged with selling beer without a license, and of the young woman arrested for prostitution have been postponed till Monday.

The further examination of the Sandy assault and battery case was concluded yesterday afternoon, the assaulting party being fined \$10 and costs.

Supreme Court.—Proceedings of the Supreme Court yesterday, Chief Justice Schaefer and Associate Justices Emerson and Boreman on the bench.

The People of the Territory of Utah, respondents, vs. Geo. Gough, appellant. The motion in this case for a dismissal of the appeal having been granted, it was ordered that a remittitur herein issue.

Erwin Davis, respondent, vs. the Flagstaff Silver Mining Company et al., appellants. The arguments in this case were concluded, and the case was submitted and taken under advisement.

Erwin Davis, appellant, vs. J. R. McBride et al., respondents; case argued, submitted and taken under advisement.

Court adjourned till this morning, at 10 o'clock.

Mount Pleasant.—Bro. Edward Cliff sends us an account of a concert held in the music hall at Mount Pleasant on the 25th inst., for the benefit of the Sunday School. The performance was artistically and financially a success, the exercises being well rendered and well received by a large audience. At the conclusion of the concert, Professor Haaler, the leader of the choir, was presented with a testimonial of the respect and appreciation with which his services were received. The gift comprised a suit of clothes, hat, boots, handkerchiefs, etc., in fact a complete outfit of wearing apparel, for which the professor returned thanks in a brief and feeling speech. The whole proceeding was of a very pleasant character and will long be remembered by all present.

The deduction of 21 persons brought from country places for treatment would leave the resident mortality 75.

Deceased was born in Lewis County, New York, May 14th, 1818; embraced the gospel and was baptized December 1841, with his family; gathered with the Saints at Nauvoo in the fall of 1845; was ordained into the Sixth Quorum of Seventies in the spring of 1846; he labored with others to build a house unto the name of the Lord; received his blessing in the Temple; was driven from Nauvoo in 1846, passing through the hardships of the journey through the American wilds, arrived in Salt Lake City, October 1848, soon after settling in Pleasant Grove; returned on a mission to his native State in the fall of 1850; received and obeyed every principle of the gospel revealed to the latter-day Saints. He was very beloved for his amiable disposition and sterling integrity. He leaves a large family to mourn his loss.
