## FOREIGN.

LONDON, 11.—No disturbances reported in any part of London to-night. Public confidence is restored. The Government has caused circulars to be sent to officials throughout the country, inquiring into the extent of the distress existing among the working people out of employment and inviting suggestions as to the best measures for the relief of the sufferers.

The Crown Solicitors have advised the Government that a conviction can probably be obtained of the Socialist leaders who took part in the mob proceedings of Monday. Such a conviction would entail two years' penal servitude on each defendant.

The mass meeting of the unemployed men of the southeastern part of London, called to assemble in Deptford to-night, has been postponed until Saturday.

Six hundred police recruits have been engaged by the government for service in London. The new men will go on duty at once, and while waiting for their uniforms will wear plain clothes with a badge on the left arm.

The movement for the relief of the unemployed workmen is spreading to the provincial towns. Two thousand rations and a large quantity of clothing are distributed in Glasgow daily. That the existence of the distress is owing to the severity of the winter is undisputed.

A dispatch from Leicester says: The hosiery operatives here are out on a strike. They are parading the streets and smashing the windows of the factory. The police charged upon the strikers, but were unable to disperse them.

A meeting of unemployed workmen was held at Norwich last night for the purpose of urging the authorities to give work to the unemployed laborers and mechanics on the new barracks, schools and jails, instead of employing convicts. Similar meetings were held at Jarrow and elsewhere.

MADRID, 12.—The *Progress*, a Zorillist newspaper, says that when the Cortes meet it will be to receive the announcement of the abdication of the Queen. For the first time in eighteen years, ex-Queen Isabel met her husband, Fracols, at mass in the Escorial, at the tomb of Alfonso. Fracols will remain in Madrid until after the marriage of the Infanta Eulalia.

LONDON, 13.—It is rumored that the government remains undecided as to the advisability of the prosecution of the Socialist leaders who are deemed responsible for the rioting which followed the Trafalgar Square meeting last Monday. The better classes of London have been thoroughly aroused to the real needs of the unemployed. Twenty thousand pounds have been subscribed during the past three days for their relief. Nearly all has been contributed by metropolitan merchants and bankers. The general public has scarcely given anything to the Maunson House Fund as yet.

PARIS, 13.—Adolph Desbarrolles, painter and author, is dead.

VIENNA, 13.—Herr Hauser, the Galician Deputy in the Reichsrath, last evening made a violent attack upon Prince Bismarck's expulsion of the from Prussia. His speech was loudly applauded.

LONDON, 13.—A dispatch from Vienna to the *Times* says: Official information has reached here from Belgrade to the effect that King Milan has resolved to sign a treaty of peace with Bulgaria no matter what action the Greek government may decide to take. Serbia will hereafter enter into a stronger agreement with Austria-Hungary.

LONDON, 13.—The striking hosiery operatives at Leicester resumed their rioting at midnight. The mob was very desperate and stubbornly refused to obey the police. However, after considerable fighting the police were successful and dispersed the mob.

MADRID, 14.—Nine dynamiters were arrested at the railroad station here to-day. Subsequently dynamite cartridges, explosive apparatus, revolvers and a number of red flags were found on the premises of a shoemaker known to be identified with the Socialist party.

LONDON, 14.—The London Missionary Society has received advice from Zanzibar to the effect that two men who returned to that place from Uganda, report that they saw Bishop Hunnington, with 50 men of his expedition, taken out for execution.

The Russian government has renewed negotiations with England with the object of inducing that country to join the international league for the extradition of political criminals.

LONDON, 15.—A meeting of the conservative leaders has been called for Thursday. The Marquis of Salisbury will preside. The meeting will be in the nature of a caucus to determine what policy the conservatives shall pursue in parliament. The principal question to be considered will be, what stand are the conservatives to take in regard to Ireland and the proposed Irish legislation of the liberals.

Lord Dufferin is decided to carry on Burma with sixteen thousand troops under command of General Prendergast for military occupation and martial law will be continued until November, as Dufferin does not think the country is ripe yet for the establishment of civil law. Dufferin has decided to send a military expedition to Shan Hills.
