## RICH ORE IN GOLD MEDAL.

#### Good Strike Reported from Property Near Elk City in the Gem State.

Near Elk City in the Gem State. Stites, Idaho, Feb. 10.--C. E. Som-ple and wife arrived in Stites on Mon-day evening's stage from Elk City en-route to Spokane on business connected with his mining operations in the Elk City district. Mr. Semple is one of the oldest steamboat captains on the Pend Orsille river in Washington and became interested in the Elk City dis-trict last year, where he located the Gold Medial group of 14 claims four miles from Elk City, between Dead-wood and Big Campbell creeks. He has had five men working in a tunnel crosscutting the ledge and says that they have just broken through a body of free milling ore 90 feet in width. Out of 60 assays the ore ran

There are many rich string-ers running through the big one body that assays up into the thousands of dollars a ton. There are other sur-face croppings that indicate that this is not the only body of ore crossing the claims and the crosscut tunnel will be pushed ahead. This property is situ-ated in the heart of the old placer dig-gings where thousands and thousands of dollars were taken out in the early days, and the placer gold evidently came from these big dykes that are now being opened up all through the district. This is said to be one of the best strikes made in the camp. Mr. Semple is owner of the Buckhorn on Fourmile. They have also been crosscutting for the ledge there. The ledge is from 12 to 29 feet wide, aver-aging 514 a ton. Assays made in Spa-kane in November showed \$704.74 a ton; and a rich vein of 10 to 12 inches on the footwall runs up into the thous-and.
