takes a spherical form, and on slow and careful cooling the oxide of aluminum forms regular and perfectly clear crystals. Great care is necessary to avoid hubbles. In this simple way it is possible to make three or four stones at a time, often a quarter of an inch across and weighing 13 to 16 carats, and as they are genuine rubles experts can distinguish them from the natural.
