FUNERAL OF HENRY LOSSIE

Southern Pacific Engineer Who Succumbed to Heart Failure on Friday at Terrace.

The funeral services over the remains of the late Henry Lossie, who died at Terrace, Utah, Friday, were held at the Episcopal church in this city yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, under the direction of the Masonic order. Rev. William E. Maison officiated in the services at the church. He eulogized the stirling character of the deceased. The church choir furnished sweet music. The Masons attended the funeral in a body and preceded the funeral cortege to the Mountain View cemetery where the order went through their ritual, and the remains were laid to rest in the family burial ground. The attendance at the funeral was large and many beautiful floral tributes were laid on the bier. Mr. Lossie was one of the oidest and most highly respected engineers on the Southern Pa-cific, and his sudden death, from heart fallure, was a severe shock to his family and many friends.

UTAH STAKE CONFERENCE

Strong Testimonies and Addresses From Stake Presidency, High Councilors and Others.

Authorities Unanimously Sustained-Stake in Good spiritual Condition -George Young's Funeral.

Special Correspondence,

Provo, Nov. 4.-The special Stake conference held in the Tabernacle yesterday was attended by large congregations and an excellent spirit was manifested. President John presided. These were present: Counselors Keeler and Holbrook and members of the High Council, and many of the bishops of the Stake. There was none of the members of the First Presidency, the Quorum of Apostles or any other prom-inent Elder, outside of the Stake authorities, present. This was referred to by President John as a fulfilment of the words of President Snow, spoken at the last general conference, viz.: that the Saints could not, in the future, expect to receive the visits of the Apostles

as frequently as they had in the past, President David John was the first speaker and expressed pleasure in seeing the large number of people present, He explained that the conference had been called as a special conference by the general authorities of the thurch for the purpose of voting on the auth-orities of the Church as they had lately been appointed, for which purpose a general conference had also been called to meet in Salt Lake City next Sunday. President John reported that, while there was room for improvement, the spiritual condition of the Stake was generally good, there appearing to be a disposition among the people to do their duties. He pointed out that im-provements could be made in the attendance of Eiders at their quorum meetings and in the interest generally taken by the Elders in their duties. There could also be improvement in the discharge of duties devolving upon the teachers. They should visit people more frequently and encourage them in living up to the principles of the Gospel. The Bishops were urged to Gospel. The Bishops were urged to bring about an improvement in this di-rection. His desire was to see new life and enthusiasm inducted in all the quorums and branches of the Priest-hood, that all might work together in union and strength for the upbuilding of the kigdom of God. He felt to say with his whole soul, "Thank God for our new president, Joseph F. Elder Keeler spoke briefly of Church organization and government, constrasting it with the secular governments of the world, and the church governments of the various religious bodies, showing that this being God's work the initiative of all organization and government in the Church rested with God and was exercised by Him, either direct or through His Priesthood, the body of the Church having the privilege of sustaining or rejecting the appointments of Church officers made by the proper authorities. In this manner the government of the Church and the appointment of officers were conducted by "Common consent," according to the law of the Lord as

made known in the Doctrine and Covenants. At the close of his address President Keeler read a resolution sustaining the action of the Apostles in the appointaction of the Apostles in the appointment of President Joseph F. Smith, his counselors, Elders John R. Winder and Anthon H. Lund, and the appointment of Elder Brigham Young as President of the Quorum of Apostles, and the calling of Elder Hyrum Mack Smith to fill the vacancy in that quorum.
