The Bunker Hill Celebration. to-day, the first marked feature of interest was a review by Governor Gaston of the entire body of militia. Major General B. F. Butler com-

manded the review. The State troops were well received, but the genuine enthusiasm was reserved for the visiting soldiery, especially the Philadelphia regiment, the New York Seventh, the Maryland Fifth and the Charleston light infantry.
