ANTI-CATHOLIC MOVEMENT.

HISTORY has repeatedly demonstrated the fact that when any class of the people living under a government are denied the rights guaranteed them by the constitution, the result is a revolution.

The wrongs done to the Catholics in this country are a lesson which, if justice is not speedily done to those which are disabled, gradually permeates the entire body politic. Freedom of religion is one of the most precious of our rights, and the denial of it is a denial of the very foundation of our government.

The arguments brought up by the Catholics in this country are a lesson which, if justice is not speedily done to those which are disabled, gradually permeates the entire body politic. Freedom of religion is one of the most precious of our rights, and the denial of it is a denial of the very foundation of our government.

It is held that as the "Mormons" are declared from naturalization, and a portion of them from exercising the elective franchise, so ought the members of the Catholic Church. It is even urged that an anti-Catholic oath be prescribed for the devotees of that faith, showing that the first insulted upon them is the denial of their legitimate rights.

Those who persecute our article yesterday, written before we dropped upon the one taken from the Chicago Times, would observe that we do not anticipate that the anti-Catholic movement is likely to receive any vigorous support from government officials in ruling positions or from ambitious politicians anxious for place. Self-interest appears to be much stronger than patriotism with men who have political bees in their bonnets, and the demagogues among them being in the majority, antagonism to the Catholics from that quarter is not likely to be robust.

The public journals are a rule, in the same way, as the politicians. It is popular to abuse the "Mormons," who are supposed to have no friends, and therefore no rights entitled to respect. There are a number of honorable exceptions to this journalistic rule, but they are comparatively few. The majority of the press in this country are in relation to the alleged threatened danger of Catholicism to the republic by the threat and strutting of it. If not, they will be a rule despite the application of political disabilities to Roman Catholics, who constitute a power in the land.
