A SENSATIONAL SUIT.

Thomas Kearns, the Mining Man, Accused by Edna Way of Seduction.

W. A. Hobbs Arrested on the Charge of Being an Accomplice to Edna Way.

Thomas Kearns, the well known mining man, was yesterday made defendant in the United States court through the filing of a suit by Edna Way, alleging seduction and asking that she be awarded damages in the sum of \$10,000.

The complaint of Edna Way is that Kearns took her in the Cullen hotel on the 1st of May, 1896, and seduced her.

The claim was filed late yesterday afternoon by Miss Way's attorneys, Morris Sumner and Morley, Zane & Culligan, and contains the following allegations:
