

PANIC DURING HUMBERT'S FUNERAL

London, Aug. 9.-A special dispatch from Rome says that a sudden move-ment of the crowd in the Via Nazionale is the king's carriage in the funeral procession passed, resulted in a punic luring which thirty persons were infured and several badly crushed. The dispach adds that it was at first thought by the officers that the new king's life was in danger and the duke of Adsta and the count of Turin drew their swords while the cavalry drove back the crowd and enclosed the king's carriage in a square. Women, the dispatch adds, fainted and shricked and a number were knocked down and trainfied underfoot, but the disaster which was seemingly inevita-ble, was averted.
