Section 35 provides as follows: "All claims against the county pre-ented by members of the board of boardy commissioners for expenses must be itemized and verified as other hains, and must state that the service as been actually rendered, and before flowance such claims must be present-it to the county attorney, who must en-iorse thereon, in writing, his opinion as to legality thereof. If the county pittorney declare the claim illegal, he pust state specifically wherein it is th-

to the legality thereof. If the county pittoney declare the claim illegal, he must state specifically wherein it is il-legal, and the claim must then be re-lected by said board." The net result of these statutes, when postrued together, is that the county juditor must audit, that is, investigate the correstness of all claims, includ-the correstness of all claims, including the claims of county commissioners, but as to the latter the county attorney must certify to their legality. The re-spective duties of the auditor and coun-ty atterney as to the claims of county commissioners must therefore not be aufused. It is no less the duty of the sunty auditor to investigate claims of souny auditor to investigate claims of the county commissioners that it is his say to investigate other claims. On the contrary, as to such claims, the many attorney is not constituted the altor, and the latter's duties as to matclaims are not imposed upon him. Assuing that the claim of the county are failed by the second missioners has been or will be insegated by the auditor, and found be correct, he simply certifies to its byfulness. He is under no duty to in-resignte the correctness of such claims and therefore no neglect of duty can be predicated upon his failure to do so.
