Chicago, June 12 .- Late this afternoon the Republican national committee completed the hearing of all contests submitted, and turned its attention to other matters. It has been in ession for several days of actual work, and has decided contests involving 119 seats on the temporary rollcall. These contests have been decided as follows:

The only complete defeat sustained was in the Fifth Virginia district, where a Foraker delegation was sented before a man was allowed to act as secretary of the district convention his own county "for white men

only." It was believed by the members of the committee that if they allowed the delegation from the convention at which this man had acted as secretary to be seated in the national conven-tion. It would place the party in the light of approving a call issued to a portion of the voters. For this rea-son it was decided to seat the con-testing Foraker delegates. In Louistesting Foraker delegates. In Louis-iana and Tennessee split delegations were seated, the entire delegation from Louisiana being considered from Louisiana being considered as one contest. The action of the com-mittee in dividing the Louisiana dele-gation made no difference to the Taft strength, inasmuch as both factions were for Taft.

TENNESSEE CASE.

The Tennessee division was made in the Eighth district in response to ur-gent appeals of National Committee-man Brownlow of that state, who ask-ed that it be done for the purpose of healing local differences and giving the party a better chance of electing a Republican representative. The del-egation from the Sixth Ohio district was divided on the evidence submit-ted.

MYSTERIOUS MME. RUISE'S **IDENTITY ESTABLISHED**

IDENTITY ESTABLISTIED New York, June 12,-The identity of the mysterious Mme. Ruise, whose name was frequently mentioned in connection with the suit of Mrs. Ellen French Vanderbilt for divorce from Alfred G. Vanderbilt, has just become public through the beginning of an-other divorce suit in which Mme. Ruise is the defendant. The plaintiff in this case is Don Antonio Ruise y Olivares, attache of the Cuban legation at Washington, and the defendant's name is given as Senora Dona Agnes O'Brien de Ruise. The complainant in the suit has not yet succeeded in ascertaining her whereabouts. There is said to be a strong likilhood that a successful prosecution of the divorce action may be followed by a suit for allenation of affection against a man as yet un-named. NEW CURRENCY ACT **IS NOW IN EFFECT**

Washington, June 12,—Secy. Cortei-you today made public a treasury de-partment circular carrying into effect the new currency act. The secretary calls attention to the fact that the act provides two methods of applying for additional national bank currency Banks excurving contiguous territory for additional hardonal bank currency Banks occupying configuous territory may organize currency associations, providing there are at least 10 banks in each association with minimum ag-gregate capital and surplus of at least \$5,000,000, while the individual banker

rregate capital and surplus of at least \$5,000,000, while the individual banker must have an unimpaired capital and surplus of not less than 20 per cent. Any member of such an association with outstanding colrculating notes of not less than 40 per cent of its capital may obtain additional circulating notes under section 1 of the act. National banks of the same stand-ing as to capital and surplus, but not members of an association, may ob-tain additional circulation under sco-tion 3 of the act. In order that all national banks entitled to take out additional circulation may join cur-rency associations, the scoretary of the treasury reserves the right to add to, and include in, the territory of an as-sociation any contiguous territory con-taining national banks which would otherwise be excluded from or incon-veniently located as to a national cur-rency association. The names of the associations must be indicative of the locality and an association may not style itself. "First National Currency association."
