LOCAL BRIEFS.

Word from Berkeley states that the Utah students at the California state university are making great records for themselves.

Local automobile agents report that the outlook for the coming season is very encouraging. As soon as spring opens a number of new ones are to be on the streets.

Parties who have been up at Promontory report that gas is coming up through the ground in such quantities and with such force that it can be lighted with a match and burns with a smart flame.

State Fish and Game Commissioner Sharp has distributed 15 dozen California quail in the past week. Four dozen of the birds were sent to Utah county and 11 dozen to Utah county. They were trapped in this county and then an abundance of them both in this county and Davis county.

BRIG.-GEN. CANNON
TALKS TO GUARD.

Takes Officers to Task Severely
For Talking Against Comrades
And Giving Out News.

CALLS THEM SNAKES IN GRASS.

Discussion on the Needs of the Militia to Bring it to a High State of Efficiency.

There was a little heart to heart talk yesterday afternoon, in the state armory from Brig.-Gen. Cannon before the officers of the national guard.

The general took the officers to task severely for talking against brother officers instead of bringing charges, if there are any to be made.

Capt. A. A. Smith of the signal corps called attention to the fact that there is a good deal of knocking going on among the officers, which is unbecoming to an officer, and it ought to be stopped.

Gen. Cannon said a hearty Amen to that proposition, and denounced the way some officers had been giving to the newspapers information that ought not to be given out until it had passed through headquarters and been officially pronounced upon.

At the same time the speaker did not blame the newspapers for printing what was given them, but he thought it would be better not to furnish such information except through the regularly accredited channels.

Gen. Cannon referred indirectly to certain officers as "snakes in the grass," officers charged with saying unbecoming things about their brother officers. But he had the best interests of the guard at heart, and wanted to see it flourish, and desired to see it recruited up to the full strength.

Gen. Cannon said that the assistant adjutant general of the regular army had told him at Leavenworth that the Utah national guard was one of the best bodies of the kind in the United States, and that it is regarded with high favor at Washington.

Lieut. Col. W. F. Beer, brigade surgeon, called attention to the need of a new armory, and Capt. Smith suggested reference to the Commercial club. But further action was postponed until the next meeting, in two weeks.

Gen. Cannon stated in reference to the coming inspection of the national guard by regular army officers, that the date, April 10, set by division headquarters at Oklahoma, was a little too early, and he would endeavor to have it set a few days ahead, by which time the men will all have new uniforms.

In the matter of unpaid expenses of the Carbon county campaign, there is money on hand to liquidate all such, and accounts will be settled without delay. As to compensating men who were injured in Carbon county and therefore unable to at once return to work after being sent home, an appeal will be made to the Legislature for their relief.

Capt. Andrews of a company of Nephi, was present, and said that the terms of enlistment of most of his men expire in April, and unless something was done in the spring army accommodations for them, his company would have to be mustered out. The captain had spoken to Gen. Burton, but that officer did not wish to take any step likely to prove an embarrassment or hindrance to his successor, so that matter will be taken up with the governor. Senator Whitmore will lease suitable quarters to the boys for three years, if the state will pay for it. E. company at Bountiful was reported as in a flourishing condition.

AUTOMOBILE EXPLOSION.

Gasoline Tank Bursts and Fire Department is Called Out.

The explosion of a gasoline tank in an automobile at H. B. Stewart & Co.'s place, at 262 State street, just before noon today, caused considerable excitement around fire department headquarters. The alarm came in that the Miller hotel was on fire and the entire apparatus from headquarters responded. One of the old boys in the engine refused to do work when the firemen tried to open it, but little time was lost as they promptly broke it down. Although the firemen made a quick run to the hotel, the blaze was out before they got there. The damage done was confined to the automobile, and does not amount to much.
