For the most part they were tired out, and needed nothing so much as rest and an oppor-tunity to allow their nervous condition to become normal. The great majority

of these people had lost all their earthly possessions in the recent catastrophe, except, in some instances, a few trin-kets which they had grasped hefore ne-cessity compelled them to flee. Those who desired to come up town
