

FLOATING FRAGMENTS.

A light snow fell last night.

The registration business was lively today.

The weather has been brighter and clearer to-day than for several days past.

Funeral of Mrs. E. H. Cannon, at 10 a.m. to-morrow, at the Fourth Ward Assembly Hall.

A telephone system is now established in Butte City, Montana, one of the most go-ahead little towns on the American continent.

The last of a series of six parties, in the 12th Ward School-house came off last night. It was well attended, and all who participated enjoyed the genial feeling which prevailed.

Mr. J. S. Williams, late chief clerk of the fuel department of the Denver and Rio Grande, has been appointed chief clerk of the general freight department of the Union Pacific to succeed the late W. H. Pater.

The six men who were arrested at the depot on Monday last on their arrival from Clear Creek, as men suspected in our last, were brought up before Justice Wm. H. Brown on Tuesday afternoon and had a hearing. One of the party, James Robert, was found guilty of having taken the overcoat and blankets and was fined \$7 and costs. The others were discharged, it having been shown that they were in no wise implicated in the transaction.

A sad accident occurred at Dayton, New, on Tuesday evening, resulting in the death of John Powell, attorney-at-law, an old and estimable citizen of that place. The body being frozen on his premises, he was taken to the well of a neighbor, Mrs. Jaques, to obtain some. It was very slippery around the well, and while trying to raise the bucket Mr. Powell lost his footing and pitched head foremost to the bottom, a distance of thirty-one feet. A man was immediately lowered into the well and his head down and the water reaching to his hips. Of course he was quite dead when taken out.

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Home Missionaries.—Home Missionaries will visit the meetings of the city wards to-morrow evening.

Regular Services.—Regular services of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, at the Salt Lake Assembly Hall, to-morrow afternoon, beginning at two o'clock.

Resumed and Suspended.—West Jordan Woolen Mills resumed operations, after a slight cessation on account of severe frost. Most of the grist mills on the river are frozen up.

Embalmed Flowers.—In the dry glass window of Z. C. M. I. are some nicely embalmed flowers that were used at the funeral of the late Father Heales, last No. ember. The embalming was done by Louis Davies.

Registration.—A large number of electors have registered to-day in that matter this has been far the liveliest day of the week, being the last upon which it could be attended to prior to the coming municipal election. Mr. H. M. Wells, Mr. Winter's assistant, has been kept quite busy.

Favorable Report.—By private letter from Elder J. S. Ferri, President of the Liverpool Conference, we learn that the work is making fair progress in that part of England. He speaks in terms of the highest commendation of the faithfulness and diligence of the Elders who assist him in his field. The reduction in numbers made by last season's emigration is being gradually made up by additions of new members.

Others Engaged In It.—Facts keep coming to the surface which go to prove that quite a large number of persons must have been engaged in the passing of counterfeit coin lately, and that other denominations than one dollar have been used. A few days ago a man who speaks with a German accent, entered the market of P. H. Lannan and ordered a small piece of meat. In taking out what appeared to be a twenty dollar gold piece to pay for it, he accidentally dropped it on the floor. The attention of the man waiting upon him was attracted by a peculiar ring of the coin, causing him to say it was bogus. The person replied nervously that it did not matter as he knew from whom he obtained it, and left the place, saying he would call again and get the meat after changing the coin, but he did not make his appearance again.

Liquor and Fire.—A gentleman of this city has handed in the following for publication:

"The amendment recently made by the Legislature, now in session in this city, to Salt Lake City Charter, gives great satisfaction to the great majority of the citizens, and especially to the genuine advocates of temperance.

We sincerely hope that the bill passed last session will become law, all its good provisions remaining unchanged, so that the people will have a voice in the sale or non-sale of strong drinks in this and all other cities and towns in Utah Territory.

"Self-preservation" is a true principle in Church and State. It is perceived, however, when the law is misconstrued and made to save the wicked at the expense of the good. Protect the righteous, punish the guilty—the innocent must be let go free. Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people.

Wisdom is manifested in law-making when words are used that all can understand.

Can our honorable legislators do anything for us in the way of preparing the way for the organization of a home fire insurance company? Is not an institution of the kind much needed? Would it not help business and strengthen our commercial position in every city and settlement of the Territory?

About Catching Cold.—The following theory in relation to "catching cold," from the *Lancet*, appears to be maintained by the experience of small boys in this locality who in "coasting," tumble about in the snow, get their feet wet and their clothing so saturated with moisture that it is frequently frozen stiff upon them. This they evidently do with measurable impunity, without catching colds.

"It is noteworthy as a curious yet easily explicable fact, that few persons take cold who are not either self-consciously careless, or fearful, of the consequences of exposure. If the attention be wholly diverted from the existence of danger, by some supreme concentration of thought, as, for example, when a captain enters a house on fire or plunging into cold water to save life—the effects of "chill" are seldom experienced. This alone should serve to suggest that the influence exerted by cold falls on the nervous system.

It is in this way that persons who do not cultivate the fear of cold-catchings are not, as a rule, subject to this affliction. This is one reason why the habit of wrapping-up tends to create a morbid susceptibility. The mind by its fear-begetting precaution keeps the nervous system on the alert for impressions of cold, and the centers are, so to say, panic-stricken when even a slight sensation occurs. Cold applied to the surface, even in the form of a gentle current of air somewhat lower in temperature than the skin, will produce the "feeling" of "chill," rise to the "feeling" of cold applied to the surface—for example, of "cold water running down the back." Many of the sensations of cold or heat which are experienced by the hypersensitive have no external cause. They are purely ideal in their mode of origination, and ideal in fact."

The moral of all this is that if you do not want to catch a cold, give little or no thought to the subject.

Back From Germany.—We had the pleasure to-day of meeting Elder Ludwig Surkhe, of this city, who returned from a mission to Europe last evening. He left this city on the 9th of September, 1879, and labored in the northern part of Germany, notably in Mecklenburg-Schwerin, Kiel, Lubeck and Bremen. His experience as a missionary has been exceedingly varied. He was hunted by the police authorities and driven from one place to another, but pursued his work with indomitable perseverance and courage. He was cast into prison six times, the whole term of his incarceration being 174 days.

Notwithstanding the difficulties with which he had to cope, he was quite successful, having baptized about forty persons, some of whom are already in Utah.

Elder Abram Cannon and another Elder have gone to the part where he has been laboring, to continue the good work that has been begun. Elder Cannon is making excellent progress, and is very faithful to his duties.

True Sisterhood.—An esteemed city correspondent, "One of the Widows," sends us the following for publication in the *News*:

"Scripture teaches us when we make a feast that we call in the poor that they may rejoice with us, and that we may make their hearts glad. Sister Julia Howe exemplified this last Thursday evening, Jan. 20th, by inviting many of the widows of the 17th Ward to dine with her. She had two elegant tables set in her dining room, loaded with turkey and all the luxuries of the season, the Bishop presiding at one, and Sister Hyde, President of the Relief Society, at the other. Her Companions and Sister Alder were also present, assisting Sister Howe in her preparations. Miss Zina Hyde, kindly and honorably assisted waiting at the table, and looked beautiful in her occupation. After dinner all returned to the drawing-room, and the evening was spent delightfully in addresses, singing, conversation and in a way that Saints always know how to be happy. At 9 o'clock the party separated, all feeling it was good to be there.

Such an entertainment, in these days, is most refreshing and surely is worthy of all imitation."

Committed.—The examination connected with the counterfeit coin case was concluded to-day. James Shields, the ex-stage driver, was committed, in default of \$500 bonds, to await the action of the grand jury.

Murray and Shepherd were discharged.

We learn that the impression that Mr. Whittemore had hampered the officers in working up this case was incorrect, and arose from his informing Shields' companion that he had been arrested. This may have put the man on his guard, but was done inadvertently.

New Zealand.—Elder J. S. Ferri wrote from Auckland, New Zealand, on the 2nd inst. He states that all nature is at its perfection there, the weather being warm and fruitful, and vegetables abundant. Elders Brimley and N. Greenstock were in Auckland, strengthening the branch of the Church in that place, but the latter soon expected to leave for the West Coast of the island, Elder Ferri anticipated returning to the interior part of the country, where he had been a short time since and where inquiries were being made regarding the Gospel.

Counterfeits in the Country.—The passers of bogus money paid a visit to West Jordan Ward a day or two since and fleeced a number of storekeepers in that neighborhood. They purchased numerous trifling articles, for which they tendered counterfeit dollars, getting the goods and change besides in return. The merchants in that locality are no richer by the visit of the scoundrels, but a trifle wiser.

Holmes.—J. Landrum Holmes' mother offers \$50 reward for finding her son, and putting her in communication with him, and letting him know that she has returned from her missionary work in China, and is with her brother, R. A. Little, in Parkersburg, West Va.

He was last heard of in Utah, in November, 1881.

Disappeared.—Diphtheria has entirely disappeared from West Jordan and vicinity. It was very prevalent in that neighborhood a short time since.

MUNICIPAL CONVENTION.

THE PEOPLE'S CENTRAL COMMITTEE.

SALT LAKE CITY, January 23d, 1882.

The People's Convention of Salt Lake City is hereby called to convene at the City Hall of Salt Lake City, on Wednesday, February 8th, 1882, at 7 o'clock p.m. to nominate candidates to be voted for at the municipal election, on Monday, the 13th day of February, 1882. The convention will consist of thirty-five delegates, allotted to the several municipal wards, as follows:

1st Municipal Ward, comprising the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 8th, 9th and 10th Bishop's Wards, 8.

2nd Municipal Ward, comprising the 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, 14th and 15th Bishop's Wards, 8.

3rd Municipal Ward, comprising the 16th, 17th and 18th Bishop's Wards, 8.

4th Municipal Ward, comprising the 19th, 20th and 21st Bishop's Wards, 5.

5th Municipal Ward, comprising the 11th, 12th and 13th Bishop's Wards, 8.

Primary meetings of registered voters of the People's party, for the election of delegates to the convention, will be held in the several municipal wards of the city, at the usual places of holding elections therein, on Monday, Feb. 6th, 1882, at 7 o'clock p.m.

Delegates should receive credentials, properly authenticated by the chairman and secretary of the meeting electing them.

Leading citizens in the several municipal wards are respectfully requested to take the initiative in carrying into effect these suggestions, relative to the primary meetings, that the voters may be properly notified of the time and place of holding the same, that the rights and liberties of the voters of the People's ticket may be fully protected, and that the delegates chosen to the Convention may be such as will best represent the interests of the people.
