

## EMERSON HEARS SOME CANDIDATES

Citizens-Democratic Rally in the  
Southeastern Part of  
The City.

JOS. S. HYDE TELLS A STORY

Man Who Came to Conclusion That  
His Wife Died of a Disease  
Called "Improvement."

Those who attended the rally at the Emerson ward amusement hall of the Citizens-Democratic party Thursday evening listened with marked attention to the speakers. The meeting was presided over by Lyman R. Martineau, who spoke briefly but earnestly upon the issues of the campaign and urged all good citizens to work for true reform and against the so-called "American" party.

"We of the first ward are entitled to some consideration," said the chairman. "We want better water service, better light and better sewer service. This evening you will hear from two gentlemen who are candidates for the city council on the fusion ticket, and I assure you if you elect these gentlemen you will receive fair treatment at their hands. The 'Americans,' of course, claim all the credit for building operations, but I want to tell you that the building on Main street was not done by the 'Americans.'"

J. HYDE'S PLEDGES.

Joseph Hyde, candidate for the council from the first, was the next speaker. Mr. Hyde made a strong plea for a square deal for all and for an honest business administration. He referred to the social evil and called attention to the frightful conditions existing under the "American" party rule, and declared that if he is elected he will do his part to see that there is some real reform and that the evils complained of are wiped out.

"I promise you that if we are elected and we spend your money you will get 100 cents value for every dollar we spend," said Mr. Hyde. "There will be no favored contractor, for any job, great or small, and if I am elected, and there is any grafting or stealing going on I shall know something about it and who the guilty parties are and see to it that the public is not robbed. I shall consider it a great favor to be called upon by the people to do that which is right and proper and to give them what they are justly entitled to. 'Improvement' is all right but there is some so-called improvement that is all wrong. I can illustrate my point better by telling you a little story. There was a good man down in Sanpete whose wife was very ill. He brought her to the city and had her taken to a hospital. The next day he inquired of the doctor as to the condition of the patient and was informed that she had greatly improved. He went out to the lake and had a good time. The next day the doctor told him that the poor woman had died. Upon his return home his friends asked him the cause of his wife's death. The old gentleman pondered some time before answering and then replied: 'She died of a disease called improvement.'"

Frank J. Hewlett followed Mr. Hyde and stated that the "American" claim of improvements is a false one. He pointed out the fact that practically all of the improvements were started under other administrations. He said that the prosperous times were the result of natural resources and not because the "American" party had been in power.

"The 'Americans' didn't make Denver, did they? No, and they didn't make Salt Lake. This city has grown and we have prospered in spite of the 'American' party. They make great promises but fail to keep them. I was assessed \$500 for sewer and was charged 6 per cent interest since last March."

SOLD LIQUOR TO MINORS.

Is the Complaint Against a Couple of  
Saloon Keepers.

Complaints were issued Thursday from the county attorney's office against George Needham and George Melich, who conduct the Red Top saloon at 59 west First South street, charging them with selling liquor to minors. The complaint was Charles Sperry, probation officer of the juvenile court. He says the liquor was sold to George Vance, a youth of 17 years, on Oct. 15. A number of similar complaints have been made recently to the juvenile court authorities and to the police, but the police have taken no action and the juvenile court will take up the prosecution of the cases.

CASE OF "RUBBING IT IN."

Charged With Investing Embezzled  
Funds to Start Rival Saloon.

Deputy Sheriff Joseph Barlow returned from Garfield Thursday afternoon with Bill Hopas, who is charged with the embezzlement of funds in the sum of \$190.95 from his former business partner Gus Papanakolas. The two men were in the saloon business in the smelter town and Papanakolas alleges that Hopas disappeared suddenly and with him went the sum of money named. Hopas in the meantime, it is alleged, went to Tooele and started up a saloon on his own account, using the money which he had taken from his partner to buy a stock of liquors, also purchased from his partner at Garfield. This was a little too much for Papanakolas, and he swore out a complaint against Hopas, and the latter is now in the county jail awaiting a hearing on the charge of embezzlement.

The man was arrested and taken to the city jail by Patrolman Carlsberg, and will be charged with destruction of property, disturbing the peace and battery.
