Natural protoplasm, the original cell substance, is thought by Prof. A. L. He has prepared an artificial protoplasm, onsisting solely of calcium metaphos-hate, and has obtained micro-photorraphs of this in actual movement in salt solution. Should Mr. Morrell decline the nomination, Mr. Thatcher will undoubtedly be the nomtnee, and would be an unusually strong
