In speaking of his work in China, the missionary says that there was not much danger in his lo-cality from the Boxers at the time of the outbreak, as his station at Wu Chang is 1,000 miles from Pekin, but to be on the safe side, the mission re-moved to Shanghai, although fears were entertained the missionaries would never reach there. The Boxer movement was directed against foreigners but the common people, he says, take kindly to Christianity, and are straight-forward and honest. Mr. Ridgley says Chinese vernacular is not so hard to learn. There are no tenses and other grammatical difficulties and 100 word suffice for ordinary conversation. But in literature there is another story to tell, as every word has a character, and the lexicon includes 40,000 of them,

The duty of the commissioner is to enforce the law. He must give a bond of \$4,000, and each deputy for \$2,000. The salary of the commissioner is fixed at \$500 per annum, and of each deputy at \$2,50 a day while actually employed. Penalty for violation of the law is a fine of \$20 to \$200, or by imprisonment not to exceed six months Referred to the committee on livestock.
