

CAPT. DREYFUS IS CONVICTED.

Sentenced to Ten Years' Imprisonment, Which It Is Understood May Be Served at Forte Corte, Island of Corsica.

London, Sept. 8.—(Special London telegrams.) The news of the conviction of Captain Dreyfus has caused a great excitement in this country. The public mind is greatly agitated, and the government is expected to take prompt action. The British public is generally in favor of the army, and expects a speedy victory over the Boers.

THE JUDGMENT.

The verdict was five to two in favor of the conviction. The court found that there were extenuating circumstances, but that the crime was proven beyond a reasonable doubt. The sentence was ten years' imprisonment.

DREYFUS MAY BE PARDONED.

It is believed that President Loubet will exercise his right of pardon. The public opinion is divided, with many favoring a full pardon and others favoring a conditional one.
