LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Pigeon Shooting.—The return match between the Salt Lake and Ogden shooting clubs is in progress this afternoon, at Buhring's on the State Road. At 1.45 p.m., when the trigger-pullers stopped for dinner, eight rounds had been shot, and the rival clubs had each killed the same number of birds. Seven rounds more would complete the match.

A Close Call.—On the 8th inst., Brother Aaron E. Cheney, of Fairview, Sanpete County, while repairing the interior of his house, unknowingly knocked down from a shelf a small bottle containing strychnine. The phial rolled upon the floor and was picked up by his two-year-old daughter, he still retaining his work, entirely unconscious of the scene that was passing below. The child's mother coming in, shortly afterward, found the open bottle in one of the infant's hands, the cork in the other, and gave it upon her life and tongue. A little time soon afterward was spent with spasms, but was careful attended to, and through the merciful efforts of his parents, is now as far as towards recovery. We learn the above from Brother H. W. Anderson, by letter.

Woman's Exponent.—The *Exponent* for December 15th is out, and is a genuine Christmas number. Emily H. Woodmansee has a poetical "Christmas Carol;" Hannah T. Kling gives "Christmas Greetings and Reminiscences;" Aunt Elm writes on "Holiday Pictures;" and the editor gives a grateful and well worded article on "The Blessings of Christmas." "Twilight Musings" is a beautiful little execution in verse by L. M. Howings, and the "Distant Shore," by Ann Fellows, is shorter and similar in theme. "Jesse Burns" is a fine little "Life Incident," by H. M. W. "These with 'Talk' to 'Homespun,'" "Too Religious," by M. E. K., "A Stranger's Sentiments," and other short pieces, and the usual quota of correspondence and selected bits, completes the catalogue. It will make good Christmas reading.

Lectures and Recitations.—Bro. William Clegg, of Springfield, writes that he is about starting out on his regular winter tour through various parts of the Territory, giving recitations and lectures, as has been his wont for several years. His pieces are all composed by himself, and are of a most entertaining and instructive character. "Infidelity and Skepticism," a lecture designed especially for the young, is one of the features of his programme; also a dramatic poem, called the "Outcast," whose design is to illustrate the vices and their hideous results that prevail in civilized countries, and an argumentative and remonstrative poem entitled "Divorce." The time occupied in rendering these is about one hour and three-quarters, just a nice evening's entertainment. We commend Bro. Clegg to the people among whom he intends to travel, and wish him every success in his venture.

A Runaway Car.—Yesterday morning an accident occurred on the Utah Southern Extension, by which one of the water cars used for carrying water from Milford up to Frisco, containing none of this useful element at the latter place fit for any purposes, hence this method of furnishing it, was knocked into smithereens. The train carrying the water was nearing Frisco, and going up a steep grade, when one of the cars, containing two tanks of water, which together weighed about ten tons, became detached, and sped down the track at a fearful rate. The 17 miles between Frisco and Milford was accomplished in 11 minutes, and the runaway car continued on its lightning descent until a short distance beyond the latter town, when it jumped the track, and in a minute was a complete wreck. Luckily no one was aboard at the time, nor did any accident take place save to the car and tanks, which may now be used for old iron and kindling wood.

Returned Missionary.—Elder Aaron D. Thatcher, of Logan, a brother of Apostle Moses Thatcher, came down to the city yesterday, and will return north in the morning. He made us a brief call to-day, and gave us a few items of his experience, while on his mission to the Southern States, from which he returned on the 9th of November. He left on the 26th of October, 1879, and while away labored principally in Virginia and West Virginia, and also visited North Carolina. He met with various classes of people, made many friends and preached the gospel wherever he went. Very few have been baptized in that region, although the meetings of the elders were well attended, and numbers acknowledged they believed the doctrines of "Mormonism," but lacked the requisite courage to come forward and join the Church. The people, as a rule, are very kind and hospitable in Virginia, and many, though not converts to "Mormonism," often assist the missionaries in their travels and take their part against their persecutors. Brother Thatcher had good health during his absence, and returns feeling benefited in every way by his experience.

Escape of a Prisoner.—On Tuesday evening about 11 o'clock, according to the *Journal*, an exciting occurrence took place in Ogden, resulting in the escape from custody of Frank Burt, arrested for larceny and on his way back to Cheyenne in charge of the constable of that city. Burt had been arrested on Saturday night by Sheriff Brown, of Ogden, on information received from Cheyenne, and on Tuesday evening was taken to the depot and delivered to the Constable who had just stepped from off the U. P. train. He and Mr. Brown with the prisoner then went up town and entering a saloon, partook of some refreshments. The Cheyenne officer drank rather freely, and Mr. Brown, keeping an eye on Burt, was not surprised to see him saunter out of the saloon when he supposed he was not observed. Brown followed Burt and clapping a hand on his shoulder just as he was stepping into a hack, took him back into the saloon and delivered him again to the Constable, with an injunction of caution to him lest he should permit his man to escape. Mr. Brown, accompanied by Officer Keyes, soon after started for Main Street, but they had not gone far before they heard pistol shots in the vicinity they had just quitted, and rushing back saw a wagon driving away from Woolner's saloon containing Burt and a resident of Ogden named Phil Ford. After them ran the Cheyenne officer, firing his pistol, a shot from which struck one of the horses and brought the team to a standstill. Ford and Burt both jumped out and departed in different directions, the former hotly pursued by the half-breed constable, who supposed him to be the man wanted. I the meantime, Burt made good his escape, and had not been heard from at last accounts. Ford was arrested by Officer Brown for aiding the escape of the prisoner, but in the minds of many he is deemed innocent of any such intent. He had been drinking, it is said, rather heavily, and was just starting for home when Burt ran out of the saloon and got into his wagon and was driven off by Ford, who, being under liquor, was unaware of the illegal and dangerous game he was unconsciously playing. The wounded horse was shot dead, afterward, to put an end to its sufferings. Perhaps the next time a Cheyenne officer comes to Utah after a prisoner he will have sense enough to keep sober, and perhaps he won't—who knows.

"A Murderous Apparition."—Under this caption the *Enquirer* of Wednesday gives the following: "Two boys, each about 13 years of age, got badly scared on Saturday night last. They had been put in the city 'jug' for fighting, and on that night were placed in separate rooms—one below and the other in an upper 'cage.' About 7 o'clock that night the boy below set up the most unearthly screaming and was soon after joined by his former antagonist a story higher up. They screamed and kicked at their prison doors for a considerable time before the officer in charge emerged from the Court House and went into the jail to see what was amiss. By this time a crowd of persons had gathered around the jail and were watching the frantic gestures of the youth lodged up stairs, who was clutching at the iron bars of the window and yelling as loud as his lungs would let him. As soon as the officer entered the jail, he found both boys pale with fright; they pleaded to be taken out—anywhere rather than that place. They had both seen a ghost—the boy below had first seen it walking toward him with a long blade knife clutched in his hand; then the boy upstairs received the same visitation, but as a harbinger of the approaching ghastly visit, he had first seen a broom that stood against the wall of the room he occupied, cutting certain peculiar capers. The terror of the urehins was so great and evidently real—so the officer thought—that he was convinced the boys were not putting up a job on him, and he removed them to his own house, where they still remain. Nothing but physical force could induce the youngsters to go back to their cells. They tell, with bated breath and pallid cheeks, the awful appearance of that terrible spectre with the long-bladed knife, and are positive that he meant to do them bodily injury by the threatening gestures the apparition made as he appeared to approach them. Are these not the same youngsters who saw a monster swimming under their while bathing in Utah Lake one day?"
