BY TELEGRAPH.

AMERICAN.

CHICAGO, 14.—Robt. J. Creighton of San Francisco, special postal commissioner from New Zealand, passed through this city today on his way to Washington. It is stated that the Australian mail contract with the Pacific Mail Steamship Company will expire next November, and it is extremely doubtful if it would be renewed unless this government made reasonable concessions as to cost of transportation. At present \$100,000 are annually expended from New Zealand and Sydney for railroad transportation across the American continent, although it is understood when the present contract was negotiated that no charges would be made for the carriage of mail. The Pacific Mail Steamship Company \$375,000 a year subsidy to carry the mail from San Francisco to Auckland and Sydney, the steamer calling at Honolulu with the American mail, and calling for it on each return voyage, for which service no charge is made. The American mail to the colonies is also carried free, the United States retaining the postage. It is intimated that unless this country can extend more liberal terms and free transportation through this country in exchange for the ocean service, and also furnish quicker transportation across the continent, the present system will be abandoned and mails carried via Suez.

The Marquis and the Princess.

BOSTON, 14.—The customary official courtesies will be extended to the Marquis of Lorne by Mayor Palmer. Collector Worthington desires to meet the *Teredos* down the harbor. If the revenue officer *Galatin* arrives in season, a party will be made up to escort the Princess up to the city. The Marquis, Duke of Buccleugh, and Col. DeWinton occupied a box at Park Theatre last evening. Two special police officers accompanied the party.

Providence, R. I., 14.—The British *Teredos*, with the Princess Louise on board arrived at Newport this morning.

Prince Louise was not very well on the voyage though the weather was agreeable. Lieutenant McLean, representing the American Navy, called his respects, and the Marquis, in obedience to a letter from the Secretary of the Treasury went on board to tender his services to facilitate the landing of the distinguished party. They left for Boston on the ordinary train at 4 this afternoon.

A Bad Leak.

SPRINGFIELD, 14.—The deadlock in the Illinois House of Representatives continued yesterday, the democrats leaving the hall when the session closed at 11 o'clock.

Nally was broached, thus breaking the deadlock. The doorkeeper was instructed by those remaining to bring in the absentees, and during his absence certain democrats attempted to re-enter the hall, but finding the door locked they took the door by force. Both parties were in caucus last evening, but no arrangement was made to settle the differences. Governor Palmer advised the democrats to stand by the position they have taken.

The Catalogue of Crimes.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., 14.—Jesse Campbell murdered Wm. Saxe and wife here December 2, 1882. He was sentenced to life imprisonment.

New York, 14.—It is rumored further discrepancies are discovered in the accounts of the late Mayor D. B. B. of Long Island City, which affect every department of the old Ring government. The deficiency amounts to nearly \$35,000 in addition to \$100,000 before known to be embezzled.

Death and Disaster.

CHICAGO, 14.—Gottlieb Schlecht, a wealthy German of this city, who has displayed signs of insanity, escaped from his keeper early one morning two months ago, and all trace of him is lost this morning, when his body was taken from the river.

Dermott, Ark., 14.—Six colored children went to a picnic in the woods. Gathering weeds for a salad they collected them, mistakingly put in strychnine for seasoning. All perished, and to-day three died; the others are dying.

Ottawa, 14.—The flood in the Rideau is rapidly subsiding. The water has fallen three feet since yesterday. No further damage is apprehended. Trains are running regularly.

Watertown, N. Y., 14.—Black River is the highest since 1880. An ice break carried off the fumes and dam at Carthage, doing great damage. Two-thirds of the manufacturing are stopped. There is great overflow in the lowlands.

Springfield, Mass., 14.—The Connecticut River is rising half an inch an hour; 14 feet 8 inches above low water this afternoon. No damage thus far.

Bismarck, Da., 14.—Three hundred feet of the Northern Pacific Railroad track, on the west side of the river, is washed out. The lowlands are all under water. The river is rising rapidly.

Dead Wood, Da., 14.—A heavy snow storm has prevailed throughout this section the past six hours. The Black Hills and Pine Ridge are covered with snow. The telegraph lines from the various cities to the hills are down. All stage lines are blocked.

Pembroke, Ont., 14.—Devon tannery and several adjoining buildings are burned. Loss, \$75,000; insured, \$50,000.

Paris, Cratfield, Md., 14.—A large fire is prevailing here. The business part of the city is burned. Loss not heard from \$75,000.

SUNDAY NIGHT'S DISPATCH.

Heavy Western Wind.

CHICAGO, 15.—Reports from various points throughout the north-west state that heavy wind storms prevailed yesterday and to-day in many localities, accompanied by driving rain. The destruction covered portions of the State of Wisconsin, Minnesota, Illinois, Iowa, and Nebraska, in addition to those of Kansas and Missouri, already reported. Considerable damage was done to houses, barns and fences, but no loss of life is reported. In Chicago and throughout Southern Illinois there was a heavy snow storm, accompanied by heavy rain. The telegraph wires were cut in many places.

Butler of Erie.

BOSTON, 15.—The steamer *Yokohama* arrived last night with 650 passengers, most of them impoverished Irish people, sent over at the expense of the British government. The passengers are mostly families, some of which number 8 or 10 persons, while they average about 5. The majority are from Galway, the others from Mayo, Down and Donegal. Most of those from Galway were evicted, and during the past winter lived as best they could, finding shelter in tents, Indian mounds and porridge bowls, and other places. An agent of the British government furnished money to those who desired to go to places beyond Boston, the amount depending upon the size of the family, some receiving a few shillings, others £2, £3, £5 or £8. A great many of the men are farmers, but seem undecided as to what they shall do, some going on to New York, others to Pittsburgh, Portland, Chicago and Canada, while some will remain in Boston and vicinity. Several of the passengers, but brought little with them in the way of household goods.

The steamer *Parthia*, from Liverpool, arrived this morning, also brought a large number of the same class of immigrants.

Philadelphia, 15.—Sixty-nine evicted farmers, from Mayo and Galway, arrived in the morning. The Rev. B. S. Kelly of Galway, was also a passenger. He has been sent to this country by the Irish Bishop of Tuam to raise money for the relief of his distressed flock.

Hokey Affair.

NORWICH, Conn., 15.—Olney Burgess, of First St. R. 1, was indicted yesterday by the grand jury, and Henry Burleigh, at Killingly, Conn., indicted, suddenly shot Daniel, slightly injuring him. In the struggle Burgess was killed. The grand jury returned a verdict of manslaughter against Burgess. He was taken to jail, and is expected to die.
