friends and in justice to my "Mormon'

riends and in justice to my stormon pupils I must write. Before coming to the home of this people I was zomewhat disturbed by what was told me of their want of in-terest in education and especially ad-vanced ideas of education. But I de-cided to see and know for myself.

Perhaps my informants had never dealt in advanced education with my brethren (all humanity are "Mormon" brethren.) my

I came first to the little city of Oxford, Idaho, a neat hamlet nestled in the lap of nature's wondrous ioneliness. As I viewed this scene I said surely a people reared in such surroundings must be interested in an education that will enable them to picture these beau-

Never can brush or pen portray the eager anxious faces of young and old who gathered that night to hear of art and the earnestness with which they worked, for a few thoughts of this great study swept away every fear as to the "Mormon" girls' and boys' love for and determination to improve opportunities for advanced education. From Oxford I went to Preston and

was never received with a more corwelcome than by the faculty of "Mormon" academy in that city. dial the

the "Mormon" academy in that city. At Richmond (my first stop in Utah) the superintendent of city schools, G. M. Thomas, had invited me to talk to his schools on drawing. (Let me say right here that in no instance have I yet found a "Mormon" superintendent of eity schools who has not extended to me the courtenies due a visiting edu. to me the courtesies due a visiting educator in their State and who had suf-ficient interest in education to reply to my letter of inquiry for art.) This is more than I can say for all non-"Mormon" superintendents. For two weeks I gave my entire time to talks and lessons to teachers and pupils of the Richmond schools then with regrets at parting with a class so enthusiastic I bade them good-bye and left for Logan. Here I pause to view the picture that will ever stand out in bold relief on memory's walls. A picture of apprecia-tion and love for this wonderful study that I had long since ceased hoping ever to find. As I stepped into the hall that night to give my talk on the principles of drawing. I saw gathered there boards of education, professors of colleges, superintendents, principals and teachers of every school in the city, all eager to learn of art.

President Tanner, of the State college, sent his carriage for me and Prof. Roberts, instructor of drawing at this college, brought and introduced me to as earnest an audience of college pupils as Tever met. All were eager to gather even the crumbs of art education.

Superintendent Merrill engaged me to give a course of lessons and talks on the principles of drawing to his schools and teachers. For four weeks I taught and talked to the Logan schools on this one subject and not once from the

One half of the farm-houses and barns about me are perfectly barren of a windbreak to the north. This gives a light, brownish white that is not so glaring as the com-mon lime, and has been found to resist moisture better than any other wash. It adheres to brick or stone or wooden walls or fences very firmly. In its application the walls are first weited with water, by which the adhesion of the wash is made stronger than if applied to a dry surface.

WHY MANY FARMS DETERIORATE.

The answer to the question, Why do farms deteriorate? is, first, because the soil is not cultivated well enough; second, because proper attention is not given to growing leguminous crops; and, third, the result of all is that more available fertility is taken away in erops than is restored by cultivation, by growing legumes and by adding manures-natural or artificial. The first great mistake is the lack of

proper cultivation. The farmer's boast is how many acres of grain he has planted, but not how well, little thinking that good cultivation makes more than half the crop. The soil needs fre-quent stirring to admit air and sunshine to help nitrification, to break down lumps and clods and fine the soil so capillarity can have full effect. It has been proven so many times that land supposed to be "poor as poverty" has by thorough cultivation alone been made to grow large crops, that it is a wonder more do not see the point and practice it. In sowing wheat after other crops the custom is to plow when most convenient, harrow once and then

A neighbor who knows how to farm made it convenient to both plough and harrow his oats stubble as soon as the crop came off, and he will probably roll and harrow once a week until he sows. This is what "farming" means, and it will surely double the crop. Farmers are getting more and more into the practice of growing leguminous plants, but not a tenth of it is done that could be to advantage. The legumes are generally deep-rooted. They not only collect and fix atmospheric nitrogen, but they bring up from depths below potash and phosphoric acid for other plants to feed upon when they shall have done with them; thus they con-serve all three of these principal elements of fertility. Professor Robertson of Canada is a

deep thinker on agricultural subjects. He has said: "Every two and a half tons of hay will carry more off a farm-er's land than two tons of fat cattle, and for two and a half tons of hay he will get on an average \$25, while for two tons of fat cattle he will get \$200. By the hay method of farming he gets \$25 from the same quantity of elements of fertility that he gets \$200 for when he grows and sells cattle." If these things be so, the farmer's interest is plainly defined.--Dr. Galen Wilson in New York Tolky New York Tribune.
