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## The Regatta.—The boat race

of the Salt Lake Yacht Club at Lake

Shore, yesterday, was socially a

success but technically a failure. The

boats which took part were the

*Cambria*, manned by Davis, Jen-

nings and a boy; *Peter*, by Barnard,

Culmer and Patterson; *Waterwitch*,

by Beattie, Jennings, Hardie and

Whittaker; *America*, by Hudson,

Young and Chase. The course was

marked by floating buoys, which

described a triangle. The distance

was to be sailed over within four

hours, or the race to be declared a

failure, and no oars were to

be used during the race with-

out forfeit. The four boats

passed the first buoy, or starting

point inside of a minute, the *Cambria*

taking the lead and maintain-

ing it. The *Peter* and *America*

ran around about 2 o'clock and

used their oars back to shore. The

*Waterwitch* also ran around and

afterward tried to make the first

buoy but from lack of wind failed.

The *Cambria* having rounded the

outer buoy was favored with a

slight breeze and sped southward

on the return, but losing her flag,

lost time in searching for it, and

arrived back just nine minutes over

the four hours, thus losing the race

which she might have won.

**Large Fire at Silver Reef.**—The

following special to the NEWS,

dated May 31st, came over the

wires this afternoon:

At about half past 9 o'clock, this

morning, a fire broke out on the

west side of Main Street, in a

plant sidewalk in front of a restau-

rant. In ten minutes the greater

part of the block on which the

restaurant was situated, was in

flames. The fire spread rapidly

west and south, a strong wind pre-

venting from the northeast. The

Harrison House, the Pioneer Res-

taurant, stores of Holtzman and

Poujade, Jacobs & Sultan, Siegel &

Marke, I. Schwartz, John H. Cas-

ady's saloon and the new postoffice,

were consumed. The fire was

stopped on the south by Rice's fire-

proof building, occupied by the

People's Banking Company, Wells,

Fargo & Co's express, the telegraph

office and Liddle Bros's store. On

the north, it was cut off by the

street, which was filled with fire

between the Barnum restaurant and

the store of Jacobs & Sultan. All

the business houses on the west

side of Main Street, excepting Lid-

dle Bros & Co, and McManus &

Read, were burned. Some twenty

of the best residences in town are

in ashes. The east side of the

street, though badly scorched and

blackened, remains entire. The loss

is estimated at a half million dol-

lars. Insurance light. All danger
