## A MALICIOUS MISREPRESENTATION.

The following appeared in a Washington, special of yesterday's date, to the Salt Lake Tribune:

"The Salt Lake Tribune mentioned but did not fully tell the public building up the cause of the Union in the Union and the cause of John T. Caine."

That sentence implies a wilful and malicious untrue. The efforts of Deluge Caine to procure the passage of the Bill for an appropriation for a public building in this city were given publicity only a short time since. He labored energetically with the Congressional committee which had the matter in hand. In answer to his earnest pleadings, the chairman informed him that the committee could not properly report the Salt Lake Bill for passage, in view of the decided as in many other and larger cities, Mr. Caine thus presented reasons why this city should be preferred to many others, such as her rapidly growing population and the immense resources of the surrounding country.

But even aside from the fact of the labors of Mr. Caine before the committee, the deplorable exhibits the injustice of the imputation thrown upon him. The Utah bill simply stated the same fact as fifty other public buildings bills.

The logic of the telegram, followed legitimately, would imply that the bill honored other causes "the dittoes and inefficiency" of the various Congressmen who supported the purpose of the author of the bill.

The defeat of all these measures simply strengthened the argument with which Mr. Caine was met when he urged a favorable report upon the one relating to Salt Lake.

## SIGNIFICANT POLITICAL MOVE.

DEVELOPMENTS in the political domain of South Sea Colonies are of a startling character. On the 4th inst., a convention assembled at Sydney, Australia, for the purpose of framing a constitution preliminary in forming a federation of the British Colonies in the South Pacific. From what source the inspiration for this work has emanated is not quite clear. Mr. Henry Parkes is reported at the head of the new development. And it is to be inferred that he has the sanction of the statesmen of the mother country. A federation of the Australian Colonies might mean, or might not mean, independence of England. It means, at all events, before protection against foreign powers.

There is a possibility, that England may yet be involved in trouble with some European powers, and an unprotected Australia would offer a tempting field for the invader. Under the new federation, a system of coast defences can be imagined. A very early establishment of a native militia organization. With these, we guess, England might look for help from her colonies, rather than as their helpless protector in case of war with Russia, Germany or some other power.

In Canada politics are assuming a shape that means a great deal. There a strong party exists, which favors annexation to the United States. The question of race as well as religion enters largely into the domestic affairs of Canada. Annexation to this country would bring with it these troublesome issues. Would that be a desirable introduction? We have already such a variety of races that fusion in some observers appears impossible. The questions of race, religion and even language have also come to the front during the past few years. Will it be prudent to invite some of this kind by annexing Canada?

The news from Mexico shows that the last of harmony does not prevail between United States citizens and people of that country. Since those who talk of annexing Mexico, but the Mexicans would not hear of it. The political pot is boiling.

## FROM THE SCHOOLROOM TO THE SENATE.

The Rev. J. H. Kyle, the Senator-elect from South Dakota, is one of those men who have come into notice quite suddenly. "Such 'woolies'" Jerry Simpson, and Esther Peffer of Kansas, he is made the subject of many a newspaper paragraph. A few months ago, he was a traveling missionary earning \$50 a month; yesterday, at noon, he became a U. S. Senator at \$6000 a year. He was at one time a teacher and school teacher in the territory of Utah. He came out here under the auspices of one of the missions, but which was evidently run away with the spirit of worldliness, when they reached the sun-shine land. The opening of this, while very difficult, as the sole of power was produced for Mr. Hendrickson, who a learned ethnologist, was placed in charge of the examination of the mummy. He was examined by sight, when the interest and concern of the party was at its greatest. The mummy was examined by lamp-light alone.

The tomb when opened, was found to contain a gigantic mummy of a man lying at full length and made of clay mixed with a sort of resinous which gives it a bright lime color and a slight elasticity, the whole appearing to have been subject to great heat. The mummy represents the naked figure, except for a very slight covering about the waist, part of the clothing remains, and a sword, on the head often every man had a helmet's worth, but topped with the head of a hawk or eagle.

The mummy was roughly mummified and of inferior taste, and of a man in middle age, with a prominent nose and a very large mouth, but with indications how as to his possible life all that the general belief now is that he died. The mummy was made of dried mud, and hence the name the mud man, or the mud mummy, as on the outside, are covered on the breast and body, on image are three incisions long of a quantity big enough to fill a glass. The first incision was right presenting the possibility of proceeding a sixth part, which she had been to bring him provisions. The second and third incisions were of the same size, and placed below the first, the latter being the largest, and the head on top is a masterpiece worthy of Caius. It holds in its mouth a many small chalices, or green glass vessel, valued by the Aztecs, which show some attempts at hieroglyphics. The girdle is made of a single piece of leather, and is fastened with a buckle, and the hands are clasped over the case, as it is short enough.

A peculiarity about this image is that the hair is represented as hanging down its back in one long plait like a Chinaman's. The figure is hollow, but contains a number of small pieces of dried meat, highly perfumed, and a somewhat larger mass of a stuff like glue.

The coffin and these relics are now on exhibition at the court house, and are to be donated to the State Museum of History and Archaeology of Tucson. No record of any value as to what race the remains are to be ascertained can be found, but it is probable that it was one inhabiting the Andes and even the mountains, and especially the Bolivian and C. R. &amp; Q. But we may hope that the mask may remain dull for some time.

W. H. Talmage, head of the Laramie City College in this city, was called today by the secretary of the Royal Microscopical Society, of London, who was on the 15th of February, 1861, elected a fellow of that scientific institution. This is an elevated honor which has been bestowed upon only a limited number of scientists in the United States.

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Dr. Talmage has met, at different times, members of the society as they were meeting through this city or our travels in pursuit of pleasure and knowledge. They have examined some of his personal microscopes and expressed much satisfaction with them. He also completed with a request to furnish the institution with specimens of Utah insects. These associations evidently led to his being admitted to fellowship, which involves the appending to his name of the letters F. R. S.

We heartily congratulate our Dr. Talmage upon this new recognition of his attainments as a scientist.
