SECY. HAY'S REPLY.

Defines United States' Position on Monroe Doctrine.

Washington, March 20.—The text of the response of Secy. Hay to the Argentine note proposing combined action of American states to resist the collection of debts by naval force was made public today. It is as follows:

"Without expressing assent or dissent from the propositions set forth in the note of the Argentine minister of foreign relations, dated Dec. 29, 1902, the position of the United States is indicated in recent messages of the president."

"The president declared in his message to Congress, December, 1902, that by the Monroe doctrine, 'we do not guarantee any state against punishment if it misconduct itself, provided that punishment does not take the form of acquisition of territory by any non-American power.'"

ONE UNFAVORABLE FACTOR ONLY

Business Interests Are Fearful of
Strikes.

SEVERAL NOW IN PROGRESS

Many Controversies Are Threatened—
Railway Blockades Being Relieved
And Deliveries More Prompt.

New York, March 20.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade tomorrow will say: "Only one distinctly unfavorable factor is reported in the business situation, and it exists more in the fear of what may happen than through anything that has actually occurred."

Several strikes are in progress, but none that seriously hamper industry, although many controversies are threatened and may interrupt trade unless agreements are speedily reached.

Progress has been made in relieving traffic blockades, and deliveries are more prompt, yet railway facilities need much extension if they are to keep pace with the nation's growth.

"Jobbing trade is very large and the advancing season stimulates re-sales in many lines. Reports from the west are especially satisfactory, agriculturists making extensive improvements, notably in the purchase of the most modern machinery. Buying for spring and summer merchandise is heavy for the interior and mills because coke could not be secured."

"A careful canvas of building operations at the leading cities makes a fair comparison with last year, outside of Chicago, where special conditions caused exceptional activity in 1902. Returns are unanimous in disclosing a decrease compared with 1901, however, which was the banner year in this respect. High cost of material and wages of labor are undoubtedly retarding influences at the present time. Railway earnings thus far favorable for March show an increase of 14.5 per cent over last year and 26.1 per cent over 1901."

"Prospects in the iron and steel industry are still conspicuously encouraging. Demand for heavy-weight woollens has decreased, most new orders being for the cheaper grades. More cancellations of early orders are reported. Much better conditions prevail in the dress goods market, both as to staples and to fancies. New England shoe shops report increase sales. Western farmers placing orders for August and September delivery. Leather is more active and tanners are not carrying surplus stocks."

"Failures this week numbered 230 in the United States, against 205 last year, and 22 in Canada, against 21 a year ago."

Carnegie Biggest Taxpayer.

New York, March 21.—It is learned from tax department sources that inquiries made as to whether Andrew Carnegie would ask for a reduction in his tax assessment have elicited the reply that he would not, and that he will pay on the \$5,000,000 assessed on the personality and on realty assessed at \$2,000,000. Mr. Carnegie will be the largest taxpayer ever recorded on the assessment rolls. His tax alone on personality, figuring at the rate of \$1.45, will be \$72,400.

Lima-Callao Electric Railway.

Lima, Peru, March 20.—The government has granted to a local syndicate the concession for a large part of the overhead trolley railroad with double tracks between Lima and Callao, the principal seaport in Peru. Work on the railroad will be begun within six months, and it is to be completed in two years.

Deficit Due to Coal Strike.

New York, March 21.—Concerning a deficit of \$47,588 shown in the last quarterly report of the Metropolitan to the state railroad commissioners, President H. H. Vreeland says it was due to the coal strike, which increased the cost of power from three to five times the normal. In a large part of the time covered by that report, and also in a lesser degree to the fact that in this quarter the increased wage schedule on the Metropolitan system went into effect.

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New York, March 21.—According to a London dispatch from the Herald, the announcement comes from Marburg that a peasant of St. Johann, in the Drave valley, has discovered the grave of the Hunsiedler king Attila in that district. Antiquarians have made repeated searches, as they were convinced that the grave would ultimately be found. The peasant who made the discovery, while digging his land in the vicinity of the Drave, a bronze coffin, beside which were several instruments, also of bronze, and underneath a large stone tablet, upon which were other inscriptions, the name of Attila.

Cripple Creek, Colo., March 21.—It is understood on good authority that the Western Federation of Mine Workers has called upon the Switchmen's union to lend a helping hand in the Cripple Creek strike by refusing to switch ore cars consigned to the "unfair" mills. It is said that the local order is inclined to give the mine workers the assistance asked for, but the matter may not be settled for several days.

New York, March 21.—Mrs. Kate Tedford Hickie, the daughter of a former secretary of Daniel O'Connell, upon conviction of perjury, has been sentenced to Auburn prison for a term of not less than 15 months and not more than three years.

Georgetown, Del., March 20.—Another sensation was sprung today in the trial of Elmer Collins, charged with the murder of his wife, Ida, when Harrison Wroten testified that when he was passing the Collins home the night before the murder he heard quarrelling and overheard the remark, in a man's voice:

"I will kill you between this and morning."

Philadelphia, March 20.—The jury of award in the McKinley memorial competition has selected five models as worthy of the \$500 in prizes offered to contestants. The memorial will be in the form of a statue of the late president, with a cost of \$30,000, and will be placed in Memorial hall, in Fairmount park. There were 38 contestants. The final award will be made to the designer of one of the five models just selected.

Died Covered with Money.

Tacoma, Wash., March 20.—George W. Manette, aged 62, and an old resident of Tacoma, fell dead on the sidewalk of Pacific avenue this afternoon. GRAND RAPIDS HOTEL BURNED

Wm. G. Hawkins, Traveling Man,
Perished in Flames.

FIRE CARELESSLY STARTED.

Guest Threw a Lighted Match Down
Among a Lot of His Own
Silk Goods.

Grand Rapids, Mich., March 20.—By the careless throwing down of a lighted match by a guest in his room, a fire was started tonight which practically destroyed the Clarendon hotel, at Canal and Bridge streets, with its contents, entailing a total loss estimated at \$100,000 and causing the loss of one life and the more or less serious injury of several persons.

Peter Sternberg went to his room on the second floor, and after igniting the gas, threw the lighted match among a lot of his silk goods, which took fire immediately, the flames spreading with great rapidity, and by the time the fire department got to work they were bursting from nearly every window.

The body of William G. Hawkins was found in a back room on the third floor, badly charred. He had been cut off from escape by the flames in front, and his room looked out over the power canal, the rear of the hotel, where it would have been greatly impossible to reach him, even if his plight had been known.

SUMMONS FOR HETTIE GREEN

Asked to Explain Why She Had Not Secured a Dog License.

Hoboken, N. J., March 21.—A summons has been issued for Mrs. Hettie Green, reputed to be the wealthiest woman in the United States, to appear before Recorder Stanton and explain why she has failed to obtain a dog license for her pet terrier.

The complaint against Mrs. Green was entered by Health Inspector Grunwald, who asked for a summons on the ground that Mrs. Green had violated the health code by not getting a license for her dog. The divorce costs \$2, and the fine for failure to procure one ranges from \$3 to \$25 in the discretion of the court. After the summons had been issued a man who refuses to give his name, came to the court and said that Mrs. Green had a dog license which she obtained in New York City, and she supposed that it was not necessary to obtain another one here.

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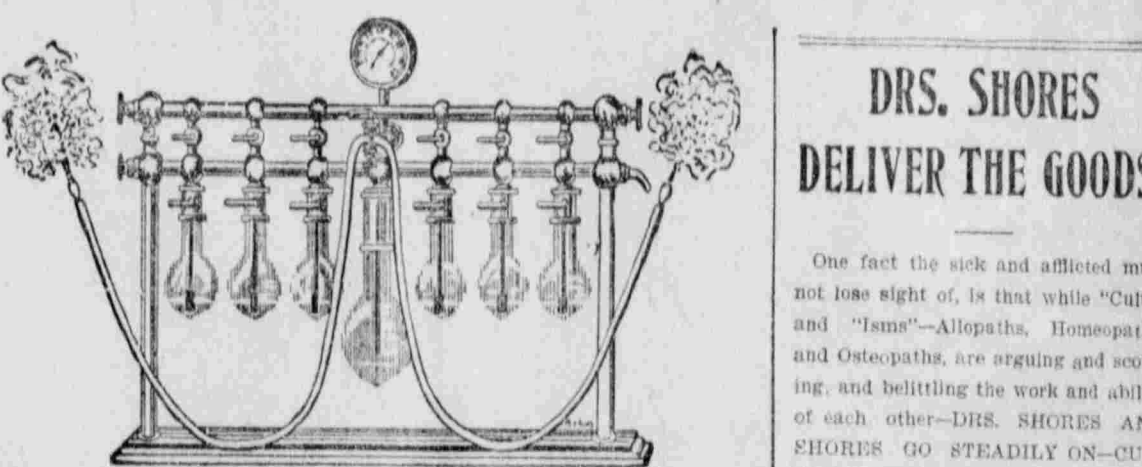
