Two of her brothers, 84 and 85 respectively, and two sisters, 88 and 94 years of age, still live. Her father died at 92 and her mother at 88. She is the mother of 10 children, six of whom survive her; also 34 grand-children and 22 known great grandchildren, there being a number of the latter living in Sweden of which the family here have no record.

Sister Anderson joined the Church in Sweden in 1871 and from that time has never faltered in her religion, though her trials have been many. She was hale, hearty and possessed her full men-tal faculties up to the hour of her death and she maintained and hore a strong to the last. She passed away like a child falling to sleep. She was a remarkable woman and the memory of her good deeds will last for ever.
