## ABOUT LOU DILLION.

How Billings Famous Mare Was Trained To Run - Some of Her Bad Actions.

At last the 2:00 trotter is here. After many years of waiting, many years of conjecture as to whether such a thing was a possibility, and after many years of the employment of putience and science in the blending of trotting strains, a horse has appeared and equalled the time that men ho longer than a week ago said was out of reach. It is Lou Dinon, a mare of short pedi-gree. A year ago there were stories that she had gone miles in 2:08 or thereabouts, and horsemen paid scant atten-tion to her; some remarked that it was to be a trial and another thing to break a record. The newspapers have been filled with accounts of how the mile was recied off, but the true story of Lou Dillon, the

but the true story of Lou Dillon, the new trotting queen, is known to com-paratively few. She was bred in Cali-fornia and was foaled in 1895, making her five years old. When first harnessed in the fall of her yearling form, Lou Dillon was so high tempered and strong headed that it was feared that it would never be possible to make much head-way with her. The fact that she had an uncommon amount of intelligence an uncommon amount of intelligence and that she seemed to exert all possible efforts in opposition to those of her handler to prevent him from conquering her made this the most difficult of tasks. ...
