RETRENCHMENT.

A Note in the Direction of Curtailing Public Expenditures.

The city council held a very important session last night, and adopted resolutions favorable to retrenching in the public expenditures. This it carried out will help even at this late day the almost depleted treasury which is now in a financial strait except that which is absolutely necessary to keep the machinery in proper repair. Batches of men engaged on the public grounds were reduced, and the retrenchment step will affect every department.

Chairman Rosell said that the rules governing the order of business were suspended, and that the committee on retrenchment be allowed to make their report at once that had been ready to be exploited. This was done.

The report sets forth that "the city's expenses vastly exceed the income that can be raised by any judicious use of right of taxation, the financial condition of the city is such that it cannot afford further increases, and without a tax levy that would be burdensome our present government cannot be maintained." The following resolutions were recommended:

Policemen's department: Two men and team, including inspector's horse, \$350 per week.

Second—Fire department: Close the tennis station; firemen at \$15 per month; horse feed, fuel, etc., \$10 per week.

Third—Police department: Trainway engineers and men, 20 per cent of other employees and teams, \$10 per week.

Fourth—Police department: That the salaries of policemen be reduced from \$25 to \$20 per month, that of police and police mount each from \$10 to \$5 per month, that of second class from \$5 to \$2 per month, and the price paid for policemen be reduced to 10 cents to 12 cents per month, \$10 per week.

Fifth—Cemetery: To receive no more than \$1 per week.

Sixth—Hospital: Closed, making a reduction of \$37.62.

Seventh—Public buildings and grounds: \$100 per month for laborers to assist in the repair of public buildings, the number of employees to be reduced from 10 to 8 per day.

The resolution was referred to the joint committee on judiciary and waterworks, and the measure was referred to the latter for further consideration, but it is thought the measure was of such weight to deserve more than a hasty consideration; hence the reference.
