New York, Aug. 28 .- Plans were completed yesterday by local labor leaders for a Labor day parade which, they elaim, will eclipse in point of numbers and display anything of the kind ever attempted in this country. Every bore in his body was broken as Williams struck the ground with fearful force. The tragedy is said to have been the result of the victim's determination to make a balloon ascension.
