SESSION OF CITY COUNCIL

Viaduct Proposition Vetoed and Again in the Hands of The Committee.

AFFAIRS OF WEBER COUNTY.

Mrs. Mary Maycock Answers Sudden Summon—Wedding Bells—Pearce-Tyler Engagement.

Ogden, Dec. 24.—In last night's session of the city council the Twenty-fourth street viaduct franchise came up in various forms, and the entire proposition is now in the hands of several committees in its original form.

First, the mayor vetoed the ordinance passed a week ago, because he believed the railroad company should maintain the entire surface, in addition to the structure. The veto was sustained. Then a letter was read from General Manager W. H. Bancroft of the Oregon Short Line, in which he rejected the franchise for the reason that the railroad was called upon to maintain one-half of the surface of the viaduct. Later a new application for a franchise was presented by the railroad company. This application consists of the provision that the city shall maintain the roadway and the railroad company only the structural part. After two readings the application went to the laws, streets and railroads committee, the engineers and the attorney.

The mayor sent a communication to the council, claiming that complaint had been made by a large number of taxpayers about blocking Twenty-fourth street the proposed viaduct site, by the railroad company, and asking that a

special officer be appointed to enforce the city ordinance in this regard. The mayor was authorized to appoint such officer at once.

The auditor reported that he had been asked by the treasurer's office, claiming that the present treasurer had refused to make out an itemized statement of all business transacted to date. Council instructed the treasurer to furnish his successor the statement called for.

PIONEER'S SUDDEN CALL.

Mrs. Mary Maycock Stricken With Apoplexy.

Ogden, Dec. 24.—Mrs. Mary Maycock, one of the pioneers of Weber county, passed peacefully but suddenly

from mortality at the home of her son, John E. Maycock at Pleasant View, Weber county, yesterday morning, from a stroke of apoplexy, aged 64 years, nine months and two days. While not strong in health, she had been able to be around the home and Sunday night sat up with the family until after 10 o'clock. She complained of a pain in her side, but awoke yesterday morning feeling better. Her breakfast was taken to her in bed, which she refused. In a short time, she complained of a weakness, and Dr. Driver was summoned, but before he could arrive, she had passed to the great beyond.

The deceased was born in England, March 21, 1841. When eight years of age she joined the Latter-day Saint church and in 1854 she emigrated to Utah, crossing the plains with Capt. Williams' handcart company. She was married in 1861 to the late Bishop Amos Maycock. Two sons, John E. and James A. Maycock, survive her. She was a devoted Latter-day Saint. The funeral services will be held Thursday at the Pleasant View meetinghouse. Interment will be made at the North Ogden cemetery.

CITY COUNCIL SESSION.

Scrap Over Question of Remission of Water Taxes.

Provo, Dec. 24.—The city council met in regular session last night and was in session until 11 o'clock. The session was rendered by the city attorney that the council had the right to remit irrigation water taxes. This brought considerable discussion, and the council was divided on the question.

BANNER YEAR FOR FARMERS.

High Prices for Farm Products—Business on Cash Basis.

Magrath, Alta., Can., Dec. 15.—This has been one of the banner years for the farmers of Magrath. Threshing is practically all finished. The two elevators are now filled and with 75,000 bushels of wheat dealers have shipped out 175,000 bushels of wheat, making a total of 250,000 bushels. The farmers realized an average of 73 cents per bushel for same.

The best crop brought \$25.00 to the farmers. Dressed hogs sell readily at 19 cents per pound; butter 35 cents per pound, eggs 40 cents per dozen, and hauled hay at \$15 per ton. Money is plentiful.

The bank of Mantraval is now opening up a branch in Magrath in splendid quarters in the large building owned by Jensen Bros. company.

Land is advancing rapidly and new settlers are arriving daily. They come mostly from the Dakotas. Six large steam plow outfits will be in operation as soon as spring opens up. This place is a printer and a tinner.

The winter has been mild so far; cattle and horses on the range are fat. Merchants here have this day declared their intention to sell goods from now on for cash only. No credit will be allowed; both farmers and merchants are united in the opinion that this move will result in great good to all concerned.
