MONOGRAMS ON APPLES

The Very Latest Novelty by Orchardists Comes From Oregon. (Special Correspondence.) Portland, Ore., Oct. 19.—It will soon be possible to have one's monogram grown on one's apples, so that fruit brought to the table of the rich may be as exclusive as the specially made cigarettes bearing the gilt initials of the host, served between courses. An experiment just made by a large grower of fancy apples at Hood River, Ore., proves that nothing is impossible to the modern orchardist. He has now cunningly labeled his apples with the name of the Cafe Martin, New York, the same being grown on the cheek of the apple. About 400 prize specimens of perfect fruit were treated by the grower. Perforated paper labels with the legend, "Cafe Martin, New York," with two stars and the figure of the martin, the bird better known as the swallow, were pasted on the cheek of the apple while green. When the fruit colored in the sun, the words and figure of the bird were left in red on a green background and the whole design has the appearance of having been stamped on in maroon ink. The fruit will be shipped to New York, and the proprietor of the well known cafe will have an opportunity to spring a pleasant little surprise on his patrons when he serves Oregon apples already labeled for him by kindly mother nature.

DISCUSS LABOR SHORTAGE

Building Operations Hampered by Lack of Men. Considerable attention was given to the labor problem in Salt Lake City at the regular semi-monthly meeting of the Salt Lake Real Estate association Wednesday afternoon. It was stated that notwithstanding the high wages paid, contractors are not able to get the number of men they want, and as a result the development of the city is being retarded. It is expected that matters will not improve for some time, as building operations, as indicated by the number of permits, will be very active for a year or more. As illustrating the situation of many contractors, the case was told of a man who proposed building a \$15,000 residence in South Temple, but was prevented from doing so because he could get no assurance from the contractor that it could be finished within a year. This scarcity of labor is not confined to the building trades, but is just as marked in domestic help. Servant girls are demanding from \$5 to \$10 per week and household help is in great demand. The chairman was authorized to appoint three delegates and three alternates to attend the National Farm Land congress, which convenes in Chicago Nov. 15. The secretary was also authorized to send literature to the convention for distribution. It was also decided to furnish photographs of Salt Lake scenes for the use of the Atlantic News service of Boston in its write-up of the city in its "Vacation series."
