Local and Other Matters.

Thermometer 53 degrees F. in the shade at 1 p.m. to-day. Fine.

Expected.—President B. Young was expected to arrive from Provo this afternoon.

Departure.—Elder Henry W. Naisbitt left this morning, on a mission to England.

In Town.—Mr. Crandall, business partner of Mr. E. W. Tullidge, is in town, accompanied by his sister.

Postmaster Appointed.—Henry P. Pace has been appointed postmaster at New Harmony, Kane County, Utah.

Box Rents.—The experiment of reducing the box rents to \$1.00 per quarter proving unsatisfactory to the Post Office Department, the old rate of \$1.50 per quarter has been re-established.

Arrived.—Last evening Bishop Edward Hunter, Bishop John Sharp and John W. Young, Esq., arrived from the east. They were accompanied by the last named gentleman's aunt, sister to his mother, whom she had not seen for forty years or more. Mrs. Pollock was also with the party.

Transit of Vulcan.—Everett, the famous French astronomer, says that the transit of the planet Vulcan over the face of the sun will be visible Oct. 2 and 3, to-day and to-morrow. The New York Herald says, "Of all who have lived on the earth it is probable that not half a dozen men have ever seen this mysterious planet that hides itself in light, yet was found by those laws of pure mathematics by which the astronomer discovers facts of the solar system which would otherwise remain forever unknown."

Tabernacle Meeting.—Elder Wilford Woodruff addressed the con-

gregation, showing in his discourse the antiquity and unchangeableness of the gospel, being eternally the same. He also treated upon the nature of its gifts and graces, which were enjoyed by those obedient to its requirements. After describing the character of the plan, principles and ordinances that existed among the ancient servants and people of God, he bore a powerful testimony to the restoration of the same divine system through the instrumentality of the prophet Joseph Smith, who received the authority to stand at the head of this latter-day dispensation, and the keys pertaining to its opening, by the ministry of holy angels and by revelation from Jesus Christ, the knowledge of which fact was the cause of so many thousands of people leaving the lands of their nativity and gathering to this place, in accordance with the predictions of the prophets and the designs of God.

He was followed by Elder John Nicholson, who spoke briefly upon the causes leading to the gathering of the thousands of people of various nationalities, characterizing it as the turning point in the history of this creation, to check the tendency to misrule and corruption that was rapidly spreading in the world and deteriorating the race, and would, in its beneficial operations, establish the principles and sentiments of universal brotherhood. He concluded by testifying that having received a knowledge that God had restored the gospel in its fullness to the earth in these latter times.

Home Manufacture.—A Capital Move.—A meeting of the Directors of the Provo Manufacturing Company was held in that city on Saturday. It was there determined to immediately open a store in Salt Lake City for the sale of their products—clothes, flannels, muscades, blankets, shawls, yarns, etc., so that the public may have a reasonable understanding of the progress that is being made in the manufacture of woolen goods in Utah. President Young tendered them the use of the Old Constitution Building gratis, during Conference, which offer was at once accepted, and arrangements were made to commence business without delay in order to take advantage of the Conference trade. We regard this a step in the right direction, and hope our citizens will give the establishment such support as will warrant the directors in making it a permanent institution.

The European Mission.—As reported in the *Millennial Star*, a camp meeting was held at Shildon, near Bishop Auckland, England, on Sunday, August 6. Services were held at 10.30 a.m., and at 2 and 6 p.m.

The following Elders were on the stand: A. Galloway, President of the Durham and Newcastle conference; local Elders—B. S. Newton, Thos. Cox, Wm. Littlefair, Robert Chalker, Wm. McMillan and Geo. Lowther.

The congregation was large, respectable, and attentive, and was addressed by Elders Galloway, Littlefair, Newton and Lowther. A tribute of praise is due to the combined efforts of the Newcastle choir and the singers of the South Church Branch, for the excellent and effective service they rendered.

Dean Rumworth, near Bolton, August 26, reported that of fifty persons have gone to Utah this season. Quite a spirit of inquiry has been created in consequence, as it is incomprehensible to the world that persons in good circumstances—comparatively speaking—should leave this country for the sake of their religion.

On the 13th of last month, a daughter of James McLatchie, aged five years, drank some carbolic acid, which she had obtained from the larder for the larder of Bolton, and the child was thereby poisoned. She was conveyed to the infirmary, near Doctors' Gardens, of Bridge street, and Mallett, of Manchester road, proceeded to use the stomach pump, and did every thing in their power to relieve the suffering of the poor child, but after the consultation they concluded that the poison had reached the brain, and that recovery was impossible, as the child was dying. Brother McLatchie procured some oil and administered to the child, who shortly afterwards rallied, and discharged much of the contents of her stomach, and at length recognized and spoke to her father, and she was conveyed home under strong protest of the infirmary doctor. On the 15th, Elders Thomas Callister and James Mellor, missionaries from Utah, being in that neighborhood, called upon and administered to the child, and I am happy to say the poison was rebuked, and the inflammation of the mouth, throat, and belly, began to subside, and the child is now well and running about out of doors as usual, for which many of us feel very thankful to our heavenly Father.
