

AMERICANS IN RUSSIA ARRESTED

Charge is Association With Several Members of the Finnish Progressive Party.

COME FROM INDIANAPOLIS.

Wm. English Walling, a wealthy Socialist, wife, her sister and Kellogg Durand, party.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 20.—William English Walling of Indianapolis, his wife and two daughters, Misses Anna and Strunsky, were arrested in the city tonight by a force of gendarmes because of their association with several members of the Finnish Progressive party. They were still being held at the gendarmerie headquarters at a late hour tonight. A representative of the American embassy appeared at the headquarters in their behalf, but he could take no action until tomorrow morning. Kellogg Durand, another American and a friend of Mr. Walling, who has been in St. Petersburg gathering material for a series of lectures, also was taken into custody, but later he was released. There was no reliance on which to hold Mr. Durand.

CHIEF PRISONER.

Mr. Walling is a wealthy Socialist. He is a grandson of the late William E. English, who was vice presidential candidate in 1896, when Gen. Hancock ran for the American presidency. For several years past Mr. Walling has taken an active interest in the Russian struggle, and this is the third time he has visited Russia.

The Finns with whom Mr. Walling has been associated also were arrested. In this party there also are men and one woman. The woman is the wife of Prof. William H. Walling, of Hastings university. The Finns have been in St. Petersburg for several days. They have been under close police observation.

Yesterday and today the Finns Mr. and Mrs. Walling and Miss Strunsky dined together, and tonight the entire party was taken into custody.

FILE ARCHIT.

The arrest took place at the Hotel de France, one of the leading hosteries of this city. The rooms of the Walling party and the Finns were thoroughly searched by a colonel of gendarmes and several assistants. The Walling party and the Finns were searched and their pockets turned. It is thought his energies in this direction in St. Petersburg brought about his arrest, together with his wife and sister-in-law.

SECY. TAFT AS PRIVATE CITIZEN

He Expects to Visit Philippines Again in About Two Years In That Capacity.

STATEMENT IS SIGNIFICANT.

Believed to Have Reference to His Chances for Securing Nomination for the Presidency.

Manila, Oct. 19.—At a banquet given in his honor in this city tonight Secy. of War William H. Taft made a most significant statement. He was referring to the fact that he had already visited the Philippine Islands three times here and in expressing his intention to come here again, said:

"I hope in another two years to visit Manila again, but then I probably will come as a private citizen."

The significance of Mr. Taft's remarks in relation to the chances of his nomination for the presidency next year did not seem to strike his audience. The secretary's speech was received with much enthusiasm by the representative Filipinos present when he declared the government was anxious and ready to help the business prosperity of the islands.

A RUNAWAY EPISODE.

While returning from Fort William McKinley last night, the horses attached to the carriage in which were Secy. Taft and Gov. Gen. Smith ran away. A detective who was on the box took the reins from the hands of the driver, but he was not able to bring the horses to a standstill. He succeeded, however, in driving them into a ditch and thus stopping the carriage. Neither occupants nor horses were hurt. There is no official program for tomorrow, and the secretary consequently will have a free day.

There was an enthusiastic demonstration for Secy. Taft at a banquet given in his honor tonight by William Norman Shuster, a member of the Philippine commission. Leading representatives of callings and nationalities were present. The speakers included Senator Osmena, the newly-elected speaker of the assembly, and Gov. Gen. Smith. Secy. Taft addressed his audience thus: "I am one of those who had doubted the wisdom of the policy inaugurated by Secy. Taft eight years ago, but he now realized that this had been the only method to bring the two people to a common ground. He said

that if one were to judge the future by the past, the success of Mr. Taft's policy would be unbounded, and he was thankful for the circumstances which had made it possible for the secretary to participate in the usual legislation. It was nearly three months ago, the general went on, that the national assembly would be radified, but it has proved its conservatism and has settled down to do business on conservative lines.
