W. Jensen. The Manti forest reserve has been marged by the addition of approxi-mately 231,000 acres and made into eight stains districts.

raing districts. All grains districts remain the same, except districts. Divisions No. 1 and 2. Division No. 2 of district No. 6 em-braces a portion of the Salina creek or vatershed, and is closed against sheep. Direct No. 7 begins at Flat canyon and runs north and meets district No. 6 which is the most northerly district of the reserve and embraces land to the slope of Spanish Fork canyon. Sheep are allowed for lambing May 1 in districts Nos. 1, 2, 3, and 4 and to remain during the remainder of the raining season, which is from July 1 to other.

The fees required for grazing priv-tess are 124 cents per animal for stile on all numbers up to and in-duing 30, and on numbers in excess of 31 animals, 25 cents per head.
