NOVEL JUSTICE.

London Society for November con-

tains a paper by H. A. Burette, LL.D.

entitled "How I fell into the Clutches

of King Theodore," and describing a

journey to Abyssinia, and a brief resi-

dence there as a prisoner in the hands
