VANDERBILT CUP
RACE OCTOBER 30

This Year to be Shortened to
Little Less than 15
Miles.

New York, Sept. 14.—The Motor Cupa racing company, which was recently incorporated to consider the feasibility of holding another Vanderbilt cup race, have decided to hold such a contest, and they fixed the date for Oct. 30. W. K. Vanderbilt, Jr., the owner of the cup, and other members of the committee, canvased the automobile manufacturers of this country and Europe and they have given assurances that between 30 and 50 cars will be entered in the racing, thus making it the largest in point of entries of any yet held. The course will be shortened to a little less than 15 miles, but the distance will remain the same. In shortening the circuit, the dangerous turns have been eliminated, so that the course as now planned will be ideal.

Official announcement of the holding of the race will be issued in a few weeks, but it is expected that within two weeks after the foreign and domestic car manufacturers will announce the names of their drivers and establish quarters along the course, so that a long season of racing may be had.
