Last evening the constable of Eden brought to Ogden a man named Samuel R. Prouitt, and turned him over to the custody of Sheriff Bailey, who will hold him until a complaint has been ; prepared against hlm. Proultt, it is claimed, has treated his wife in a cruel manner. An effort was made last evening to find County Atty. Hulaniski, so that a complaint could be prepared, but he could not be located, hence the matter went over until this afternoon.

About nine months ago Prouitt went to Eden, Weber county, where he was employed by Peter Shupe, shortly after-wards a daughter of Mr. Shupe fell in love with Prouitt and on Oct. 29, 1902, marriage license was granted to S. Prouitt and Miss Ida Shupe, and they were married, but the life of the young girl, it is understood, has been danger almost ever since. It is claimin danger almost ever since. It is claim-ed by her family that a short time ago Prouit threatened to kill her and held a sharp ragor over her throat, and has in other ways acted the brute. The girl's parents took her part and de-fended her against his brutal treat-ment; this enraged him and he threat-ened to kill Mr. and Mrs. Shupe. Yes-terday morning he became angry and threatened to kill the whole Shupe fam-the the could get a gun, and he told ily if he could get a gun, and he told a friend that he had a razor with which he intended killing Mrs. Shupe and then cutting his own throat. This state-ment was communicated to the constabis, who placed him under arrest and ble, who placed him under arrest and brought him to Ogden. When he was searched before being placed in the county jail the razor was found in his inside coat pocket. Mr. Shupe had been informed that Prouitt had a wife and family in the small town of Seymore, ind., and wrote to the sheriff there, who answered that he has a wife and ebedeon there whom he descrited and children there whom he deserted and that he is a bad man. BRIGHAM CITY.

EAST SIDE CANAL PROJECT. Proposition Laid Before the Citizens

Of Boxelder.

Special Correspondence. Brigham City, Boxelder Co., Feb. 18.-At 3 p. m. today, in the First ward hall, citizens of Brigham City and sur-R. Cutler of the Utah Sugar company, and Secy. of State Hammond, to devise means and formulate plans for the ex-tension to this city of the Bear river canal system. A similar meeting was at Honeyville in the forenoon. held

Both meetings were well attended and were addressed by President Charles Kelly, Hon. J. T. Hammond, T. R. Cut-ler and Oleen N. Stohl. It seems that a water company, rep resented by the secretary of state, Hon. J. T. Hammond, will obtain the water from the sugar company, and will open the canal and will make its own terms

the canal and will make its own terms for the land owners. The terms proposed to the people of Deweyville, Honeyville and south along Bear river the \$30 per acre, and pro-vides for annual payments and an an-nual rental of \$1.50 per acre. Water for 7,000 acres of land must be subscribed for before the causel can be assured A for before the canal can be assured. A committee was appointed at the Honeyville meeting to solicit subscriptions, and it is believed that part of the prop-

osition will be made a success, At the meeting in Brigham City Pres. ident Kelly presided and he explained the situation. Mr. Hammond submitted a proposition that there would be an additional charge for water on ac-count of the greater distance that it must be conducted, and that the price would probably be about \$40 per acre. The price would be fixed in accordance with the cost of bringing out the canal. A committee consisting of B, H. Jones, J. D. Call, Mayor Boden, O. W. Snow and E. A. Box of this city, Robt. C. Young of Perry, Joseph Hubbard and Helgar Packer of Willard was appointed to canvass for the 7,000 acres of water right.

MRS. WILLIAM TAYLOR DEAD.

Devoted Pioneer Lays Down Life's Burdens at 75.
