According to reliable reports received from Nicaragua, a big fight is there between a mining company whose interests are close to the Henduras border, and the Standard Oil company. In the capitalistic warfare the Rockefeller concern is represented by the Tidewater Oil company of Honduras, and the United States and Nicarague company, of Nicaragua, The arrest and imprisonment of William C. Albers, a native of Iowa, and president of the Limon company, which is fighting the oil trust, was one of the incidents in the struggle. His wife's devotion doubtless saved him frem a term in prison.

Albers was recently released from a Nicaraguan prison where he was thrown on a faked charge so that a tobacco monopoly in which President Zelaya and members of his cabinet are said to be interested, could be enabled to seize a big tobacco crop which Albers had stored.

Mrs. Albers stood by her husband throughout his trial which dragged along for weeks. The charge against Albers was contempt of a town mayor and slander of the government. While Albers was in jall Mrs. Albers was made the victim of all sorts of indignities. She was hissed in the streets and one day, while going to visit her husband a Nicaraguan officer mount, ed on a horse deliberately rode her down calling on her husband in his cell window to witness his act. Mrs. Albers injuries confined her to bed for several days. The character of Albers trial was so farcial that, after his conviction, the government deemed it wise to pardon him. The pardon included banishment.
