Mrs. O'Keefe was 29 years of age. She leaves three children, the clidest being 5 years. The remains will be taken to Heber for burial. The funeral will be held Thursday.

JAILBREAKER RECAPTURED.

Tom Green Makes Futile Dash for Liberty-Advent of Spring. Special Correspondence.

Moab, Grand Co., March 7.—At 2 o'clock last Sunday morning, March 4. while this little town lay wrapped in slumber, a man by the name of Tom Green, who was confined in the jail, became tired of his surroundings, and cutting through the heavy corru-gated iron celling of his home, crawled through the upper loft to a point where through the upper loft to a point where a chimney is built from the top of the upper joist, through the roof. By undermining the same, it was thrown to the ground, thus making an excellent avenue for his escape, which he made by way of a rope made of the heavy canvass used for bunks in the cells. upper mess road. This he kept until
he struck a heavy rim rock, when he
curaed northwest, with the intent, no
doubt, of throwing the trailers off.
Up to this point he seemed to take
pains to leave a plain trail, but from
there back across a rough and broken
country to the valley below the town,
and on to the Grand rvier, his trail
was extremely difficult to follow, as
every precaution was taken to avoid
making tracks in the sand or loose
dirt. But Sheriff Somerville and deputies were determined to overhaul their ties were determined to overhaul their man if possible, so cut across the river, his trail was struck and followed north his trail was struck and followed north from the river through a very rugged country. The man was overtaken in the afternoon of the same day, at a point in the Salt Valley country, just as he was entering a prospector's camp.

### CARING FOR THE , NEGLECTED FRUIT TREES.

By Robt. S. Northrop, Horticulturist,

Now is the time of the year to prune those neglected trees. The general orchard also should receive its annual pruning about this time of the year, but, for the interests of those who have a few trees which have been neglected and allowed to form too much wood, this article is written.


If the orchard is of bearing age, one should take a saw, never use an ax, and cut out all limbs which are growing in the same direction. By this, I mean those which are seeking to occupy the same space around the tree. They should be removed so that only one limb is in that space which it is best adapted to fill. If any other limbs so exist on the tree that they are conflicting or have a tendency to grow so that they will conflict, they should be removed.

Any dead wood also should be taken out and if any diseased or injured parts are apparent remove them also. This would be all the pruning a neglected tree should receive the first year. If one attempts to bring a tree long neglected into perfect form in one year's pruning, too great a setback of the top will be the result, and it will be followed by a very vigorous growth of water sprouts.

Of course, eventually the tree should be formed, but this can be accomplished in several seasons, leaving only the work outlined above for the first year. Even this will cause some water sprouts. Next year, then, some of the many extra limbs not already removed should be taken out and gradually a tree of good form, productive and profitable, will result.

The manner of cutting all limbs should be given attention. We so often find trees which have had a limb cut off leaving a stub of several inches remaining. If this is the case, the stub generally dies and the tree cannot heal the wound made by the cutting. If, however, we cut the limb close to the limb upon which it is situated and parallel with it, a quick healing of the wounded surface and, consequently, smaller liability of disease entering is the outcome.

Who is entitled to be called basketball champion of Utah? In most of the places where the game is played, the season is now considered closed. Jan. 15 a league was formed of all the teams who cared to enter, and a series of 19 games was played to settle the question. The Provo B. Y. U. team came out of the series with a clean record of victories, and was

declared state champion. Since the final game, the B. Y. U. has had track team work to do, and its basketball team considered its season over At the L. D. S. U. in this city the team has been abendoned, and a track squadhas been ordered out for outdoor athletics. The Weber Stake Academy team, however, is still in the harness, and ready to play again, and no doubt the other teams could likewise be made ready for work in a few days. Whether they will wish to stake their hard-samed positions of 10 games in the lengue, on a single game with an outsider, which was not ready to join the league when it was organized, is not yet decided.
