"He is lying for money with which to build a church when he returns to Salt Lake City. According to his own account, he has collected \$13,000. He said the poor women who are leaving polygamy come to him with their children so fast that he needs more money to feed and clothe the poor innocents, as he is the only Christian in Utah. When the Cullom bill shall pass he hopes that the rest of the women and children will be free to come to him. Turning his eyes heavenward, and squeezing out a few tears, he appealed to the ladies first. They, moved to pity, came down with their greenbacks, the sight of which caused a change in the countenance of that lying missionary.'
